Introduction

1.1 Twenty Point Programme - 2006

- 1.1.1 Alleviation of poverty and improving the quality of life of the people, especially of those who are below the poverty line, has been the prime objective of planned development in the country. Over the years, the meaning of economic development has shifted from growth in per capita income to the expansion of opportunities. The government, through various programmes/schemes, is helping its citizens to expand their capabilities. In order to achieve these objectives, package of programmes comprising schemes relating to Poverty Alleviation, Employment Generation, Education, Health, etc., called the Twenty Point Programme (TPP), has been in operation since 1975. In view of the changing scenario of the country over the years, the programme has been restructured thrice in 1982, 1986 and 2006. The present programme now called Twenty Point Programme-2006 (TPP-2006) is in operation since April 2007.
- **1.1.2** TPP-2006 has various points/items for the benefit of both the rural and urban people, taking cadre of all the requirements of the deprived and adversely affected population. TPP-2006 has 20 Points covering 65 items (*Annexure-1*). These 65 items coincide with various programmes and schemes of the government which are administered by the Central Nodal Ministries/Departments and by and large are implemented through the State Governments/UT Administrations. The Ministry of Statistics & Programme Implementation has been given the responsibility of monitoring all the 65, of which some are reported on quarterly basis, and the others on annual basis. The details of 20 Points covering 65 items, the parameters under these 65 items, names of the nodal agencies and the frequency of reporting are available in *Annexure-1*.

1.2 Monitoring Mechanism

- 1.2.1 In order to effectively monitor the Twenty Point Programme, this Ministry has developed a Management Information System (MIS). The Management Information System (MIS) consists of a Quarterly Progress Report (QPR) and an Annual Report. The Quarterly Progress Report (QPR) covers monitoring of achievements in respect of the 13 crucial items (containing 19 parameters) against pre-set physical targets, whereas the Annual Report presents an analytical review of the performance of all the 65 items under the programme. The sources of information for the Annual Report are the Central Nodal Ministries and the State/UT Governments.
- **1.2.2** All the States and the Union Territories of the country have a monitoring/evaluation unit under a nodal Department, which has been entrusted with the responsibility of monitoring all schemes/items covered under the Twenty Point Programme. The units have functionaries at block and district levels, to monitor and collect information for the different schemes of the Twenty Point Programme.

1.2.3 Besides the monitoring done at the state level, individual scheme/ programme covered under TPP-2006 are also monitored by the Central Nodal Ministries concerned. The charter of this Ministry is to monitor the TPP-2006 as a whole in a holistic manner with a view to enhance its effectiveness.

4.2 Marketing and Infrastructural Support to Farmers: The Government has been playing an important role in developing Agriculture Marketing system in the country. There is a need to enhance private sector investment in development of post-harvest marketing infrastructure for which various schemes are also implemented.

4.2.1 Agricultural Marketing Reforms:

- i) Sustainable growth and development of agriculture and allied sectors directly affect well-being of farmers and rural people at large, their prosperity and employment and also forms an important resource base for a number of agro-based industries and agro-services. With coordinated and integrated efforts made by policy makers, agricultural scientists and more so by farmers, the food grain production has gone up substantially and growth of horticulture crops has surpassed even the food grains production and productivity. Considering this, present government has made a paradigm policy shift from merely ensuring food security to nutritional and price security. For facilitating better value of the produce by the farmers, accessible, competitive, efficient and barrier free markets with adequate marketing infrastructure and real time market information is being considered instrumental to supplement the Government's effort towards doubling of farmers' income in a time bound manner. In order to realise the same, reforms in agricultural marketing sector is considerate important.
- **ii**) As a part of reform agenda, Department with the objectives to create barrier free market, enhance competition & transparency in transactions and widen choices to farmers for sale of their produce, launched National Agriculture Market (e-NAM) on 14th April, 2016. Only those States/UTs are eligible to link their markets to e-NAM portal, which have undertaken reforms in their APMC (Agricultural Produce Market Committee) Acts in respect of (i) e-trading; (ii) single point levy of market fee across the State; (iii) single unified trading license valid across the State. To strengthen the reform process, revamp other reforms agenda and back up this e-NAM project through facilitative legal framework & policy in this sector, Department has formulated a new Model APLM Act 2017 [Agricultural Produce and Livestock Marketing (Promotion & Facilitation) Act, 2017].

iii) 7 vital areas have been identified by DAC&FW:

- Establishment of private market yards/ private markets managed by a person other than a market committee.
- Direct purchase of agricultural produce from agriculturist (Direct purchasing from Producer).
- Establishment of farmers/ consumers market managed by a person other than a market committee (Direct sale by the producer)
- Contract Farming
- Promote and permit e-trading.
- Single point levy of market fee across the State/ UT
- Unified Single Trading License valid across the State/UT.
- **iv**) Deregulation of marketing of Fruits & Vegetables Fruits & vegetables being perishable crops need different set of markets and marketing system with reduced supply chain and adequate marketing infrastructures including cold storages & cold chain. Existing organised system of marketing through network of APMC markets used to be attributed for high post-harvest losses, long intermediation in supply chain and low return to the farmers.
- v) Department in consultation with NITI Aayog and States formulated a holistic and facilitative model Act, popularly known as Model APLM Act 2017, which was released on 24th April, 2017.
- vi) Since inception of the Scheme and up to 30.11.2017, a total of 38,755 storage infrastructure projects (including erstwhile GBY) having a capacity of 65.01 million MT were sanctioned and subsidy to the tune of Rs. 2763.68 crores was released against the total sanctioned subsidy of Rs. 3403.59 crore under the scheme. In addition to this, a total of 18,513 Agricultural Marketing Infrastructure Projects other than storage infrastructure (including erstwhile AMIGS Scheme) have been also been sanctioned and subsidy of Rs. 1741.34 crore has been released against total sanctioned subsidy of Rs. 2076.47 crore under the scheme, since inception and up to 30.11.2017.

An area of about 4.97 lakh ha has been covered under Micro Irrigation and constructed 39808 water harvesting structure till 31st December, 2017.

5.1 Social Security for Agricultural and Unorganized Labour: The term "unorganized labour" has been defined as those workers who have not been able to organize themselves in pursuit of their common interests due to certain constraints such as casual nature of employment, ignorance and illiteracy, small and scattered size establishments, etc.

As per Census 2011, there are about 36.25 crore workers in the country, but only a small segment of the organized work-force is covered by some form of social security. For the rest, a job is the best guarantee for social security right now.

'The Unorganized Workers' Social Security Act, 2008 was enacted on 31.12.2008, followed by the framing of Unorganized Workers' Social Security Rules, 2009. The Act has come into force w.e.f. 16.05.2009.

7.1 Rural Housing - Pradhan Mantri Awaas Yojana (Grameen)

7.1.1 Physical and Financial Performance during 2017-18:

The target under PMAY-G is to construct 1.00 crore houses by March 2019.

- i. By March, 2018 = 51 lakh houses
- ii. By March, 2019 = 100 lakh houses

Against an allocation of Rs. 24859.76 crore for the scheme (including 5% set aside for Special Projects) of Pradhan Mantri Awaas Yojana - Gramin for the year 2017-18, Ministry of Rural Development has released an amount of Rs. 20878.51 crore. Funds to the tune of Rs. 43458.59 crore (Figures reported by States/UTs on AwaasSoft to Ministry of Rural Development includes the funds sanctioned in the previous year) have been utilized by the States.

A total of 16.13 lakh PMAY-G houses have been completed cumulatively in years 2016-17 and 2017-18, while 21.76 lakh houses have been sanctioned in year 2017-18 so far.

2.61 crore beneficiaries have been identified based on SECC-2011 data as eligible to receive assistance under PMAY-G after due verification by Gram Sabha and review by Appellate Authority.

Towards closure of Indira Awaas Yojana — So far 72.74 lakh incomplete Indira Awaas Yojana (IAY) of were completed.

The progress under PMAY-G for 2016-17 and 2017-18 is as follows:

- i. Registration on AwaasSoft= 76.82 lakh households which is 80.50% of the target given to the State/UTs
- ii. Geo-tagging = 66.02 lakh houses (85.94% of the target)
- iii. Sanction of houses to beneficiaries = 60.55 lakh (79. 17% of the target)
- iv. Release of 1st instalment = 56.32 lakh (78.82% of the target)
- v. Release of 2nd installment = 39.78 lakh (51.78% of the target)
- vi. Houses completed = 16,13,172 houses.

South-East Asia Region of WHO has been certified polio free. India has achieved the goal of polio eradication as no polio case has been reported since 13th January 2011.

Global Scenario: out of 6 WHO regions, 4 regions have been certified polio free

- WHO Region of the Americas- 1994
- WHO Western Pacific Region- 2000
- WHO European Region- June 2002
- And On 27 March 2014, the 4th WHO South-East Asia Region was certified polio-free, meaning that transmission of wild poliovirus has been interrupted in this block of 11 countries including Bangladesh, Bhutan, Democratic People's Republic of Korea, **India**, Indonesia, Maldives, Myanmar, Nepal, Sri Lanka, Thailand and Timor-Leste.

- **9.6 Two Child Norms:** Intra Uterine contraceptive Devices (IUCD): Copper containing IUCDs are used for long term spacing of child birth. Two types of IUCDs are used under Family Planning programme;
 - Cu IUCD 380 A (effective for 10 years)
 - Cu IUCD 375 (effective for 5 years)

Sterilization: The following method can be used by either of the couple and are permanent in nature i.e. considered to be irreversible

- Female sterilization: There are two types currently used in India, MinilapTubectomy and Laparoscopic female sterilization
- Mole sterilization: Two types are currently used in India, conventional and Non scalpel Vasectomy. Non scalpel vasectomy involve puncturing instead of incision, thus avoiding the need for stitches.

11.3 ST Families Assisted:

National Scheduled Tribes Finance and Development Corporation (NSTFDC)

During the year 2017- 18, National Scheduled Tribes Finance and Development Corporation (NSTFDC) has sanctioned financial assistance of Rs. 158.40 crore for 13793 beneficiaries as on 31.12.2017.

This includes sanction of Rs. 146.82 crore under Term Loan scheme for 8729 ST beneficiaries.

The Corporation has released Rs. 78.92 crore for implementation of various sanctioned schemes, up to 31.12.2017.

11.4 Rights of Forest dwellers – Owners of minor forest produce:

As on October, 2017, about 17.60 lakh individual titles have been granted over an area of 41.20 lakh acres of forest land with an average of 2.36 acres of average land per title.

Similarly, 64,000 community titles have been distributed over an area of about 99.85 lakh acres of forest land.

Odisha has the distinction of issuing highest number of titles which is 4,16,531 (4,10,579 individual titles and 5,952 community titles).

Chhattisgarh has the distinction of having highest forest area over which titles have been issued under this Act. The total forest area over which title has been issued in Chhattisgarh is 24,59,298.43 acres.

POINT 13: युवा विकास (YOUTH DEVELOPMENT)

14.1 Sports for all in Rural and Urban Areas: Panchayat Yuva Krida Aur Khel Abhiyan (PYKKA) scheme was introduced as a nation-wide rural sports programme in the year 2008-09. Rajiv Gandhi Khel Abhiyan Scheme (RGKA), a Centrally Sponsored Scheme, was introduced in 2014-15, expanding the erstwhile "Panchayat Yuva Krida Aur Khel Abhiyan (PYKKA)". A new umbrella Scheme "Khelo India" was launched during the financial year 2016-17 after merger of existing scheme Rajiv Gandhi Khel Abhiyan (RGKA), Urban Sports Infrastructure Scheme (USIS) and National Sports Talent Search System Programme (NSTSSP).

14.1.1 Financial Implementation of the Khelo India Scheme:

The allocation made during 2017-18 for the Khelo India is Rs. 350 crore.

Amount released against Project approved under Khelo India during 2017-18 (up to 31.12.2017) is Rs. 143 crores.

Grant Released under other verticals of revamped Khelo India Scheme during 2017-18 (up to 31.12.2017) is Rs. 68 crores.

14.2 National Youth Corps (NYC): National Youth Corps (NYC) Scheme was launched in country during the year 2010-11, encompassing the erstwhile '*Rashtriya Sadbhavana Yojana*', which is merged into a new 'umbrella' Scheme called "Rashtriya Yuva Sashaktikaran Karyakram RYSK". Key points are:

As per the provision of the scheme, a total of 12,000 volunteers in 623 districts are being deployed every year.

There is a selection committee under Chairpersonship of DM/DC of the district for selecting volunteers. Volunteers in the age group of 18-29 years are being deployed for maximum period of 2 years duration only.

Each volunteer is being paid Rs. 5000/- as monthly honorarium with effect from October 2016 earlier each volunteer was being paid the monthly honorarium of Rs- 2500/- only.

During the year 2016-17, a total of 10081 volunteers were deployed across the country.

14.3 National Service Scheme (NSS):

National Service Scheme (NSS) is one of the flagship programmes of Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports aimed at developing character and personality of student youth in schools and colleges. NSS was launched in the Birth Centenary Year of Mahatma Gandhi in 1969 in 37 Universities with about 40,000 students with primary focus on the development of personality of students through community service. The motto of the NSS is "Not me but You".

Enrolment of NSS Volunteers: As on 31.03.2016, NSS had about 36.58 lakh volunteers enrolled in 39,695 NSS units spread over 391 Universities/ +2 Councils, 16,278 Colleges/ Technical Institutions and 12,483 Senior Secondary Schools.

Adoption of Villages/ Slums: During 2017-18 (upto 31.12.2017), NSS units have adopted 25,032 villages/ slums for their activities.

Special camping Programme: During 2017-18 (upto 31.12.2017), 11,310 Special Camps were organized in villages/ slums across India, involving 2,50,703 volunteers.

16.2 Prevention of Pollution of Rivers and Water Bodies:

Presently NRCP (excluding Ganga and its tributaries) has covered polluted stretches of 31 rivers in 75 towns spread over 14 States at a sanctioned cost of Rs.4517.82 crore.

An amount of Rs.2180.97 crore has been released to various State Governments for implementation of various pollution abatement schemes and a treatment capacity of 2455.43 million litres per day (mld) has been created so far under NRCP (excluding Ganga and its tributaries).

Under Municipal Solid Waste Management, 100% door to door collection is being done in 55,913 wards out of the total 82,607 wards in 2017-18. POINT 18: ग्रामीण ऊर्जा (ENERGIZATION OF RURAL AREA)

19.1 Bio-diesel Production:

It is estimated that the demand for diesel and petrol will raise from 80.4 MMT and 26.1 MMT respectively in the year 2017- 18 to 110 MMT and 31.1 MMT by the year 2021-22 if the present situation prevails.

The Government, vide notification dated 29th June, 2017, has allowed for direct sale of Biodiesel (B-100) for blending with High Speed Diesel to all consumers, in accordance with the specified blending limits and the standards specified by the Bureau of Indian Standards. Pursuant, OMCs and concerned Ministries have been requested on 9.8.2017 to take appropriate action for implementation of the said order.

Recently, the work related to bio-fuels has been transferred from Ministry of New & Renewable Energy to Ministry of Petroleum & Natural Gas. To spur growth in Bio-fuel industry, this Ministry has initiated the process of formulating the National Policy on Bio-fuels – 2018 and is planning to come up with a scheme to incentivize setting up of 2G (second generation) Ethanol Bio-refineries based on crop residues and Municipal Solid Waste (MSW).

The Government, vide notification dated 29 th June, 2017, has allowed direct sale of Biodiesel (B-100) for blending with High Speed Diesel to all consumers, in accordance with the specified blending limits and the standards specified by the Bureau of Indian Standards.

During the period April-November, 2017 Biodiesel quantity procured was 43551 KL vis-à-vis 34910 KL procured during the same period in 2016 i.e. increase of 24%.

19.6 Supply of Kerosene and LPG:

19.6.1 Kerosene: Key features - Allocation of Kerosene in States, and Stock of Kerosene lifted and distributed:

Ministry of Finance, Department of Expenditure, Public Finance (Central-I) Division has recommended in September, 2017 that the allocation of PDS Kerosene to States should be brought down gradually through monthly cuts, in accordance with the recommendations of the Expenditure Management Commission (EMC) and the distribution of PDS Kerosene should be targeted to the really needy who need it for illumination and cooking purposes. Accordingly, an allocation of 50,48,900 KL of PDS Kerosene has been made to the States/UTs for the year 2017-18.

Direct Benefit Transfer in PDS Kerosene (DBTK) Scheme has been launched to bring reforms in allocation and distribution of PDS SKO distribution system, for better subsidy management, and also for reducing subsidy outgo by means of curbing diversion of subsidized kerosene.

DBTK has been implemented in all districts of Jharkhand. Other States have been requested to join the Scheme. Further, States/ UTs are encouraged to become `Kerosene Free' by bringing all households under LPG. So far, UTs of Delhi, Chandigarh, Daman & Diu, Dadar and Nagar Haveli & Puducherry and the States of Haryana, Andhra Pradesh & Punjab have become `Kerosene Free'.

19.6.2 LPG: LPG Consumers and Quantity of LPG distributed to dealers

During 2016-17, more than 3.31 crore new LPG connections have been released and during 2017-18 (upto 31.12.2017), more than 2.26 crore new LPG connections have been released. As on 31.12.2017, National LPG coverage has reached 79.2%.

There are 189 LPG Bottling Plants operated by Public Sector Oil Marketing Companies and 19375 LPG Distributorships in the country as on 01.12.2017. From 01.04.2017 to 01.01.2018, 683 new LPG distributorships have been commissioned by OMCs and 949 Letter of Intents (LOI) have been issued by OMCs to setup new distributorships. To increase number of LPG distributors, advertisement for selection of 6149 new LPG distributorships has been released in various states across the country and selection process is underway. As on 06.01.2018, draw for 3555 locations have been conducted.

Subsidy on Kerosene and LPG: As on 1 st December, 2017, the Oil Marketing Companies are currently incurring under recovery of Rs. 12.44 per litre on PDS Kerosene and Government is providing cash compensation of Rs. 252 per cylinder under DBTL.

20.1 With a view to develop the backward areas in the country, the item titled "Backward Regions Grant Fund (BRGF)" was kept under Twenty Point Programme for monitoring. The BRGF Programme has been delinked from budgetary support of the Central Government with effect from the financial year 2015-16.

POINT 20: ई-शासन (IT ENABLED e-GOVERNANCE)

21.1.1 Central and State Governments: Achievements under the National e-Governance Programme:

29 MMPs are providing full/partial services, 5 MMPs are under implementation and 10 are under design, development and scoping stage.

1898 e-Governance services are being rendered under the said MMPs (Source: eTaal.gov.in from 01-01-2013 to 28-02-2018).

These MMPs delivered more than 304.64 crore e-transactions with an average of 25.38 crore transaction per month during Year 2017.

From April, 2017, more than 261 crore electronic transactions per month have taken place at both national and state level e-governance projects including the MMPs, in current FY 2017-18 till 28th February, 2018.
