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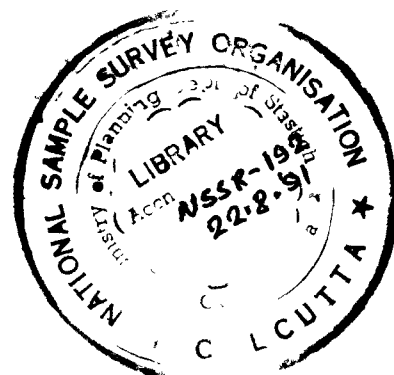

CHAPTER ONE INTRODUCTION

1.1. The data on household consumer expenditure are being collected in each round of National Sample Survey (NSS) beginning from the first round which started in 1950. These data are generally being processed roundwise and published in the form of ‘NSS Tables with Notes’ series. One set of tables on consumer expenditure for some broad items, based mainly on summary results in block (11) of schedule 16 (integrated household survey) of nineteenth round, has been brought out on a priority basis in NSS report no. 179. The present report gives estimates of consumer expenditure for several other items not covered in the earlier report and is based on the detailed data collected in blocks 6—10 of the same schedule

1.2. It may be mentioned that for the first time in NSS a number of socio-economic enquiries like demography, employment, consumer expenditure, enterprise and capital formation which had so far been conducted independently, have been integrated together and the data relating to these enquiries have been collected in a common schedule from a common set of sample households in the nineteenth round of NSS.

1.3. The nineteenth round of National Sample Survey was started in July 1964 and continued upto June 1965 thus covering a period of complete one year. The survey period was divided into six sub-rounds each of two months duration.

The data on household consumer expenditure were collected for the last 30 days preceding the date of survey and the estimates based on data collected during the six sub-rounds actually relate to the period June 1964 to June 1965.

1.4. The geographical coverage of the survey in the nineteenth round was rural and urban areas of the Indian Union excluding Andaman and Nicobar Islands, Laccadive, Minicoy and Amindivi Islands, the Union Territories of Goa, Daman, Diu and Pondicherry, North East Frontier Agency, Nagaland, Ladakh, district of Jammu & Kashmir, Langleh subdivision of Mizo Hills (Lushai) in Assam, and Mao, Ukhrul and Tamenlong sub-divisions of Manipur.

1.5. Altogether 14974 sample households from 8472 sample villages and 9943 sample households from 4572 urban sample blocks (including big cities) were surveyed during the whole period of survey. Also, from big cities 1582 sample households were selected from 650 sample blocks.

1.6. The field work for the central sample was undertaken by the Directorate of National Sample Survey in all States except in West Bengal, Bombay city, where it was done by the field branch of the Indian Statistical Institute.

1.7. The estimates in all tables are given by a pair of independent and interpenetrating net work of samples and also by the combined sample. The usual technique of interpenetrating net work of samples (IPNS) had been employed both at collection and tabulation stages.

1.8. Estimates are given for rural, urban and city sectors. City sector comprises of 4 big cities namely Bombay, Calcutta, Delhi and Madras. The urban sector covers the city sector also.

1.9. A brief summary of the results is given in Chapter Two. Four appendices are attached to the report, the first of which (Appendix I) gives statistical tables with an explanatory note and the second one (Appendix II) briefly describes the outline of the design of the survey and the procedure of estimation adopted. Extracts from the Instruction to the field workers are given in Appendix III Appendix IV gives the facsimile of the schedules of enquiry.

*The draft report (No. D213) was first submitted by the Indian Statistical Institute, Calcutta to the Government of India in March 1970. It was revised subsequently and resubmitted in December 1970.

CONCEPTS AND DEFINITIONS

1.10. Concepts and definitions as followed in the consumer expenditure enquiry continue to remain the same as in earlier rounds. Some of the basic concepts are explained below :

1.11. *Household* —A household is a group of persons usually living together and taking principal meals from a common kitchen. A boarding house, a hotel or a hostel is treated as a cluster of households, where each individual boarder (with his dependents or guests) form a separate household. Household maintained and fed directly by Government such as prisons, police quarters, cantonments, hospitals, asylums and relief camps are, however, excluded from the scope of survey.

1.12. *Household member* —Any person who takes his principal meal with the household for at least 16 days during a period of 30 days preceding the date of enquiry is considered to be a member of the household. Such a person may be the head of household or a relation or protege of the head, or an employee or a guest of the household.

1.13. *Household size* —The number of persons (as defined above) in a household gives the household size. The information was recorded in item 2 (household size II), block 2.

1.14. *Household Consumer expenditure* —Consumer expenditure comprises all expenditure incurred by the household during the reference period (30 days preceding the date of survey) exclusively towards its non-productive purposes. Thus, all expenses towards enterprise activities of the household are excluded. While consumption by the pet animals of the household is included in the household consumption, consumption by livestock of the household is excluded as it forms a part of the enterprise expenses of the household. The concept of consumption is not uniform for all items in the schedule. For items belonging to the category of food, intoxicant and fuel and light (block 6) consumption implies actual amount consumed (irrespective of the amount purchased in cash or kind) during the reference period. For clothing items of block (7) consumption implies maiden use only, that is, use for the first time during reference period. So far as the items of blocks 6 and 7 are concerned consumption out of transfer receipt in kind like receipt of loans, gifts, charities, free collections etc. is included in the household consumption, while transfer payments in kind like loans (advanced or repaid), gifts, charities etc. are excluded from the scope of household consumption. Consumption of goods purchased in cash is evaluated at the actual purchase price that of goods produced by the household, at the ex-farm or ex-factory price and that of goods received by barter exchange or by transfer receipts, at the average retail price prevailing in the locality of the sample household during the reference period. In case of items like miscellaneous goods and services, consumer rents and taxes (block 8) and durable goods (block 9), there is no separate concept of purchase and consumption as in the case of items of blocks 6-7. The actual expenditure incurred (in cash or kind) on an item of consumption during the reference period towards its purchase, construction, maintenance, repair or use for non-productive purposes is considered to be the consumer expenditure on that item. Expenditure towards purchase of land and building or construction of building for residential purposes is excluded from perview of the household consumer expenditure as it is considered as an expenditure towards capital formation of the household. Expenditure towards repairs and maintenance of residential houses is included. Second-hand purchases are, however, excluded from the scope of current consumer expenditure.

1.15. *Cash purchase* —Cash purchase includes purchases made during 30 days preceding the date of survey and only such purchases as are made for non-productive purposes are considered. That is, purchases for household enterprise purposes are completely left out. If purchases are made both for productive and non-productive purposes, the part ascribable only to non-productive purposes is taken. Barter purchases, are ignored. If the commodity is purchased at different rates during the reference period the average price obtained by dividing the total value by the total quantity purchased is recorded. Credit purchases are also included and are treated on slightly different lines than in previous rounds. If a household makes any purchase on credit and no payment is made by the household during the reference period towards such purchases, the quantity of goods purchased during the reference period and the corresponding purchase price are in that case, to be accounted for as usual. But the value of credit purchase is not to be entered since no payment is made during the reference period. If, however, the household makes payment towards its credit purchases, made earlier than the prescribed reference period, during the reference period, the value of such credit purchases is recorded.*

1.16. *Consumption out of home-grown stock* —The commodities which the household consumed for domestic purpose during the reference period out of stock produced by itself is covered under the item. A household staying in urban area may bring home produced commodity from its 'village home' and consume. Such a consumption is treated as consumption from home-grown stock. It is evaluated at ex-farm rate,

CHAPTER TWO SUMMARY OF RESULTS

2.0. NSS report no. 179 dealt with some broad items of consumer expenditure (based mainly on the summary results in block (11) of schedule 16 of NSS 19th round). The present report gives estimates of several other items which were not covered earlier. The summary tables presented in this chapter are derived from the detailed tables given in Appendix I. The figures given in this chapter on summary results are based on the combined sample.

2.1. Quantity of foodgrains consumed per person for a period of 30 days in rural, urban and city sectors was found to be 17, 12 and 10 kilograms respectively. The corresponding figures for consumption of cereals were 16, 11 and 10 for rural, urban and city sectors respectively. Table (2.1) shows the quantity of rice, wheat and cereals in rural and urban areas in India. The quantity of rice consumed per person for a period of 30 days was comparatively more than that of wheat in both rural and urban areas. The difference was much more in rural than in urban areas. The table also shows that quantity of rice, wheat and cereals consumed increases with the rise in expenditure levels. Further, while the quantity of rice, wheat and cereals consumed per person increased with the increase of expenditure levels both in rural and urban areas in India. There was no such specific trend in case of cities.

It is found that for each item of foodgrains except wheat, and for pulses and salt the quantity consumed was less in urban areas than in rural areas. The difference was more significant in case of cereals and foodgrains than for pulses and salt. Table (2.2) gives the value of consumption of some selected items of consumption per person for a period of 30 days in rural, urban and city sectors. The items selected are foodgrains, vegetables, fruits and nuts, sugar, gur etc., tobacco and products, cotton clothing (handloom, powerloom and others), education, medicine and medical services, conveyance and house rent. Analysing different items of consumption it is found that the value of consumption of foodgrains was higher in rural areas than urban areas. Amongst the food items value of consumption of sugar, vegetables, fruits and nuts was higher in urban than in rural areas. Amongst the non-food items, namely tobacco and products,

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cotton clothing, education, medicine and medical services, conveyance and house rent, value of consumption was higher in urban areas than in rural areas. Out of these items difference between rural and urban areas for education, medicine and medical services was very significant.

2.3 Table (2.3) gives the per capita value of cash purchase, consumption out of home-grown stock, and total consumption of foodgrains for a period of 30 days for rural, urban and city sectors in India. It is found that value of consumption out of home grown stock per person for a period of 30 days was Rs. 5.91 in rural areas, Rs. 0.62 in urban areas and Rs. 0.06 in cities. On the other hand, corresponding value of cash purchase per person was 4.89, 7.83 and 7.28 rupees in rural, urban and city sectors respectively.

2.4. Table (2.4) gives consumption out of home-grown stock as percentage of total consumption of cereals and pulses for rural, urban and city sectors. The percentage ranges from 0.82 for cereals gram and cereal substitute in cities to 50.90 for the same item in rural areas.

2.5. Table (2.5) gives in kilograms the quantity of rice, wheat and cereals consumed per person for a period of 30 days for NSS 15th to 19th rounds of NSS. The table gives a comparative picture of consumption in different periods. The table provides for a check for consistency of estimates. The table shows that estimates are quite consistent for different periods.

APPENDIX I

(i) EXPLANATORY NOTES ON TABLES

1. Three sets of tables are included in the report. One set represents tables for the entire rural areas and the other set for the entire urban areas. The third set represents tables for the four big cities of Bombay, Calcutta, Delhi and Madras. The urban areas include these four cities as well. For convenience of reference, the table numbers have been coded. The left hand most digits stand for the sector to which the tables belong *i.e.*, 1 for rural, 2 for urban and 3 for cities (four big cities only). The digits following the first point from left stand for the nature of information. The digit following the second point refer to regions for which estimates are supplied. The regions are coded as follows :

2. The Tables, according to the nature of information they supply, are grouped in the following way :

- (i) distribution of sample households :
- (ii) percentage distribution of estimated number of households.
- (iii) percentage distribution of estimated number of persons.
- (iv) average number of persons per household.
- (v) value of consumption per person for a period of 30 days by items of consumption.
- (vi) quantity of consumption per person for a period of 30 days by selected items and by monthly per capita expenditure classes.
- (vii) value per person for a period of 30 days of (i) cash purchases, (ii) consumption out of home-grown stock, (iii) total consumption by selected items.
- (viii) percentage of households reporting possession to total number of households by items and by per capita expenditure classes.
- (ix) distribution of sample households by monthly per capita expenditure levels and by classes of household value of durable goods possessed.
- (x) percentage distribution of estimated number of households by monthly per capita expenditure classes and by levels of household.

The estimates in these tables are given by states and all India and by monthly per capita expenditure classes for both rural and urban sectors and also for big cities except for the tables listed under (v), (vi), (viii), (ix) and (x) which are at all India and all cities (pooled) levels.

3. The monthly per capita expenditure classes have been grouped into 14 classes as follows :

The groups 0—8, 8—11 etc. stand for 0—less than 8, 8—less than 11 and so on. Estimates for all classes pooled together are also presented.

4. Separate tables have been provided for each of the state and all India for both the rural and urban sectors, for each of the four big cities of Bombay, Calcutta, Delhi and Madras and all cities pooled.

5. Tables on 5 and 6 series (suffix at second place of decimals) give the value and quantity of consumption per person for a period of 30 days by monthly per capita expenditure classes in rural and urban areas and big cities. The tables are supplied at all India level. The items included are rice, wheat, jowar, bajra, barley, ragi, small millets, cereals, gram, cereals and gram, cereal substitutes, cereals, gram and cereal substitutes, pulses and products, salt. The tables are presented by per capita expenditure classes.

6. Tables on 5 series, in addition to the above-mentioned items, also include some additional items such as vegetables, fruits and nuts, sugar, gur etc., tobacco and products, cotton clothing : handloom and powerloom, cotton clothing : others, clothing others (silk, wool etc.), education, medicine, medical services, total services, conveyance, house rent, total rent, taxes and supari. In all, tables in 5 series cover 31 items on value of consumption. Out of 31 items 15 items are common with tables in 6 series.

7. Tables on 7 series give the value of cash purchase, value of consumption out of home-grown stock, value of total consumption per person for a period of 30 days in rural and urban areas in India and also big cities. Items included in each of these tables are rice, wheat, jowar, bajra, maize, barley, ragi, small millets, cereals, gram, cereals and gram, cereal, substitutes, cereals gram and cereal substitutes, pulses and products, salt. Tables have been provided for each state, all Union Territories pooled and all India. The tables are given for all expenditure classes pooled.

8. Tables in 8 series (suffix at second place of decimal) give the percentage of households reporting possession to total number of households by items and by per capita expenditure levels in rural and urban areas in India and big cities pooled. The items covered in each of these tables are almirah bedstead, other particulars, gramophone, radio, other musical instruments, metallic utensils, torch light, clock, watch, electrical fan, sewing machine, bicycle. In this connection it may be noted that the numerator is the estimated number of households reporting possession of a particular item in a particular expenditure level and the denominator, the total number of estimated households in that expenditure level.

9. Tables in 9 series (suffix at second place of decimals) presents the distribution of sample households by monthly per capita expenditure levels and by levels of household value of durable goods purchased in rural and urban areas : all India and all big cities pooled.

10. Tables in 10 series (suffix at second place of decimal) represent percentage distribution of estimated number of households by monthly per capita expenditure levels and by levels of household value of durable goods purchased in rural and urban areas in India and all big cities pooled. The class ranges of value of durable goods possessed in rupees will be 0—25, 25—50, 50—100, 100—150, 150—300, 300 and above and all classes. Thus, these tables are presented under two way classifications *i.e.* monthly per capita expenditure classes and value of durable goods possessed in rupees.

11. It may be noted that for some items presented in report No. 208 (Priority I items) and the present report the differences may occur. This may be due to the fact that the preliminary report was based on the data reported in the summary block (block 11) whereas the present report is based on the data obtained from blocks 6—10 of the schedule after scrutiny.

12. The estimates in each table are given by sub-samples (indicated by S1 and S2) and by combined sample (indicated by comb.)

13. It may be noted that estimates in some of the tables are based on a very small number of sample households. In such cases, it is advisable that the estimates should be used with sufficient caution.

APPENDIX II

SAMPLING DESIGN AND METHOD OF ESTIMATION

1. *General*—A stratified two-stage sampling design was adopted in both the rural and urban sectors. Villages formed the first-stage units in the rural sector and blocks in the urban sector. Households were the second-stage units in both sectors. For schedule 16 the design was self-weighting for each state and union territory in the rural sector and for each sector of towns and cities within each state or union territories in the urban sector.

Sampling design for rural sector

2. *Stratification*—The country was divided into 48 agricultural regions prior to the 16th round of the NSS by grouping contiguous districts of a state having similar crop patterns and population densities. These regions had been used in the subsequent rounds, and remained the same for this round also except for some changes in Gujarat, Rajasthan, Manipur and Tripura. Strata were formed within each region by grouping contiguous tehsils having similar population densities and altitudes, and having good transport and communication facilities amongst them such that the sum of the size measures of the villages was the same for all strata within each State/Union Territory. The size of a village was the ratio of its population to the average population per village in population class 0—499 of that state, rounded off to a suitable integer. The number of strata to be formed in a state was obtained by dividing the number of villages allocated to it by 24 and the total size measure of a stratum was given by dividing the total size for the state, by the number of strata. For equalising the total sizes of the strata, the sizes of some villages were suitably increased or decreased without, however, deviating much from their original sizes.

3. *Allocation*—In the nineteenth round, a total of 8472 villages were proposed to be surveyed for the central sample. The allocation of sample villages to the different states was based on a joint consideration of rural population, area under cereal crops and investigators available. This allocation was modified to ensure a minimum sample size of 360 villages for each state and about 200 sample villages for union territories of Manipur and Tripura and to make them multiples of 24 to facilitate 4 samples of 6 villages each per stratum. The allocation to the regions within each state was proportional to their total size (related to population) and since the strata were formed so as to equalise their size content. The allocation to the strata within a State were equal.

4. *Selection of villages*—The 1961 census list of villages was used as the sampling frame for selection of villages. The tehsils within each stratum were arranged in a serpentine order by considering geographical contiguity and 4 independent sub-samples of 12 villages each were selected circular systematically with probability proportional to size measure, size being rounded off to its population mentioned earlier. In each sub-sample the villages with odd orders of selection formed the central sample and those with even orders of selection formed the state sample. The 12 villages of sub-samples 1 and 3 were surveyed by one investigator and the 12 villages of sub-samples 2 and 4 were surveyed by another investigator. The unit of selection was the 1961 census village but the revenue village corresponding to the selected census village was the unit of survey. If a stratum was too large in area and/or if good transport facilities were not available between some segments of it the stratum was divided into a convenient number of investigation zones so that the area of each zone was of manageable size and good transport facilities could be available within each such zone. Two investigation zones were selected independently with probability proportional to their total size. From each of the two selected investigation zones two sub-samples of 6 villages each (1 and 3 or 2 and 4) were selected with pps systematically as described above.

5. *Selection of hamlet*—Some of the big sample villages were divided into a given number of hamlet groups (specified in the sample list). In each such village the investigator formed the specified number of hamlet groups of approximately equal population content and selected one of them at random for socio-economic survey.

6. *Selection of households*—The households in a sample village/hamlet group were arranged by six classes on the basis of their means of livelihood and household size. This was done to ensure a proper representation of these characteristics in the sample to be drawn. From the sampling frame so constructed for a village, a sample of 22 households on an average per village was drawn linear systematically. This constituted the combined sample for a number of socio-economic enquiries to be conducted, through household schedules 16, 17, 12 and 10·1. Finally, from the combined sample so drawn from a village a sub-sample of 2 households was selected on an average, linear systematically for canvassing schedule 16. It is to be noted that the interval and the random start for the combined sample and for the sample for schedule 16 had to be fixed before hand so as to make the sample design self-weighting as mentioned before.

7. Estimation procedure :

Let k = number of strata in a State/Union Territory.

n_s = number of sample villages selected for a sub-sample for the entire round from s^{th} stratum.

h_{si} = number of households selected from the i^{th} village in the s^{th} stratum.

y_{sij} = the characteristic for the j^{th} household in the i^{th} village of s^{th} stratum.

M = the constant rural multiplier for the given state/union territory.

Y = the total of characteristic y for the given state/union territory.

Then \hat{Y} , an unbiased estimate of Y built up from a sub-sample for the entire round is given by

For unbiased sub-roundwise estimates of total, six times the given multipliers were used in the formulae, because one-sixth of the total sample was surveyed in each sub-round.

8. The constant multiplier M was obtained by dividing the total number of rural households of the State/Union Territory estimated during the middle (*i.e.* in Jan. 1965) of the round by the number of rural sample households allocated per sub-sample for the entire round total state/union territory.

Sampling Design for Urban Sector

9. *Stratification*—In each State/Union Territory, cities and towns with population 50,000 or more in the 1961 census formed one stratum (sector 1) and rest of 1961 census towns formed the other stratum (sector 2). In Maharashtra, 3 strata were formed; Bombay city (sector 0), the rest of sector 1 and sector 2.

10. *Allocation*—The total sample size 4572 blocks was allocated to the States/Union Territories in proportion to their 1961 census urban population with twice the weight to sector 1. The allocations were modified to ensure a minimum of 144 sample blocks in each state and rounded off to multipliers of 24 blocks except for Himachal Pradesh where 12 blocks were allocated. In finalising the allocation the available investigator strength and rural work load in each state was also kept in view. The state allocation was divided between the sectors within it in proportion to the number of blocks in them with twice the weight to sector 1 except in Delhi and Tripura.

11. The size of each block was taken as its estimated population (suitably rounded off). From each sector, sample blocks were selected, in the form of 4 independent interpenetrating sub-samples, pps systematically, the sampling interval in sector 2 being twice that in sector 1.

12. *Selection of sub-blocks*—Sub-division of the very big blocks is specified in order to reduce the workload. In a block where sub-division was specified in the sample list, the investigator formed the required number of such sub-blocks of about equal population content and selected one of them with equal probability for survey.

Selection of household—The procedure of selection of households in urban areas was more or less same as that adopted in rural areas (given in para 7 of this Appendix).

13. Estimation Procedure :

Let k = number of sectors

n_s = number of sample blocks selected for sub-sample for the entire round from s^{th} sector

h_{si} = number of households selected from the i^{th} block in the s^{th} sector

y_{sij} = the characteristic for the j^{th} household in the i^{th} block in the s^{th} sector

\hat{Y} = the total of the characteristic y for the given state/union territory.

Then, \hat{Y} , an unbiased estimate of Y built up from a sub-sample for the entire round is given by :

14. For sub-roundwise estimates of 'totals', six times of the given multipliers were used in the formulae because one-sixth of the total sample was surveyed in each sub-round.

15. Although the data were collected for 4 independent sub-samples estimates are presented in the report party-wise. Party I was formed from sub-samples 1 and 3 and party II from sub-samples 2 and 4. In context of the report party I and party II are referred as sub-samples 1 and 2 respectively.

16. *Sub-sample estimates :*

If \hat{Y}_1 and \hat{Y}_2 are the two independent sub-sample estimates of total, the combined estimate \hat{Y} is $\frac{1}{2}(\hat{Y}_1 + \hat{Y}_2)$

17. *Per capita estimates :*

If Y_i and P_i are the estimated total value of characteristic under study and estimated total of number of persons for the i^{th} monthly per capita expenditure class respectively, then

APPENDIX III

EXTRACTS FROM INSTRUCTIONS TO FIELD WORKERS : NSS. NINETEENTH ROUND :
JULY 1964—JUNE 1965

Consumer Expenditure

Data on consumer expenditure were collected through schedule 16 Integrated Household Survey (blocks 5—11). Extracts from the Instructions to field workers (volume I) Section 8. Schedule 16 : Integrated Household Survey (Consumer Expenditure) are reproduced only for the relevant items which are presented in the report.

8.1.0 Block 1—*Identification of sample household*

8.1.1 *Items 1—6, 8—13* : These items will be copied from the respective items of General Schedule 0.1/0.2 of the concerned sample village/block.

8.1.2 *Item 7 : Sample household ; Item 14 : House Number and Item 15 : Name of head of household.*

These items will be copied from columns (17), (3) and (1) respectively of block 6 of Schedule 0.1/0.2 :

8.1.3 *Item 16 : Name of informant.*—The informant's name will be recorded here.

8.1.4 *Item 17 : Informant's relation to head.*—This will be recorded in code numbers which are : self-1 ; other household member (excluding head)-2 ; others (excluding codes 1 and 2)-3.

8.2.0 *Block 2 : Household characteristics.*—Information on some household characteristics of the sample household is to be entered in this block as described below.

8.2.2 *Item 2 : Household size II.*—This relates to those members of the sample household whose length of stay in the sample household as entered under col. 22 of block 5 during the reference period was 16 days or more. For this item only codes 1 and 3 of the membership type codes need be considered.

8.2.9 *Household monthly per capita expenditure* : The actual monthly per capita expenditure as recorded against line 19, col. 7 of block 11 should be entered here in rupees correct to two places of decimal.

8.6.0 *Blocks 6—11 : Consumer Expenditure and inventory of selected items.*—Data relating to household purchase and consumption for non-productive domestic purposes should be collected in blocks 6—9. The reference period of collection of data for these blocks is 30 days preceding the date of survey. Information relating household inventories for a few selected items is required in block 10 and the reference period for such information is the date of survey itself. It may, however, be noted that no account of expenditure relating to productive enterprise of the household, if any, should be made in these blocks. In block 11, summary of consumer expenditure will be recorded from blocks 6 to 9.

8.6.1 The items for which the information will be collected in the schedule are printed on the schedule. Serial numbers are given against each item to serve as the codes for these items. The sub-groups of items are indicated by sub-totals. The important sub-groups which are provided in block 11 are, printed in the appropriate lines in blocks 6—9. The individual items of a sub-group are to be entered in the blank lines just above the sub-total lines representing the sub-group. The figures mentioned in brackets against each sub-total line give the item code of individual items constituting the sub-group. Some of the sub-totals have been shown in italics along with the items in the item code list. These have also to be recorded after the information of the corresponding items are entered in the appropriate lines in the block. **IT IS TO BE NOTED THAT THE ENTRIES ARE TO BE MADE WITH RESPECT TO THE REPORTING ITEMS ONLY i.e. THOSE ITEMS WHICH HAVE BEEN PURCHASED OR CONSUMED DURING THE REFERENCE PERIOD.**

Block 6 : *Cash purchase and consumption of food, pan, tobacco, intoxicants and fuel and light* :

8.6.2 *Columns 1 & 2 : serial number and description of item.*—The name or description of items purchased or consumed during the reference period is to be mentioned under column 2 and the corresponding item code (i.e., the serial number of items in the list) should be put under column 1. **IN NO CASE SHOULD THE INVESTIGATOR ALTER THE CODE NUMBER OF AN ITEM OR PUT ARBITRARY SERIAL NUMBERS UNDER COLUMN 1.**

8.6.3 *Columns 3—5 : standard unit, local unit (name).*—These columns are provided to convert data collected in terms of local units into standard units.

8.6.4 Column 3 gives the name of standard unit specified for the item. The names are printed in this column wherever possible and also mentioned in the list of items. **IT IS TO BE NOTED THAT IN NO CASE THE SPECIFIED STANDARD UNIT SHOULD BE CHANGED BY THE INVESTIGATOR.** When entering an item in col. (2) of block 6, the investigator should take care to record the name of the corresponding specified standard unit also in this column.

8.6.5 The name of the local unit in terms of which the data on quantity of cash purchase or quantity of consumption of an item will be collected is to be mentioned under this column. A local unit is the unit in which commodities are exchanged in a locality. It may be a unit of weight or unit of volume measure. When the local unit is a measure of weight, the symbol (w) will be noted (besides the name of the unit) and when it is a volume, the symbol (v) will be noted.

Choice of local unit : While collecting data on quantity of cash purchase or on quantity of consumption, the investigator should, first of all, find out in what local unit the price of an item is quoted in the locality. He should then choose that local unit for recording data under columns (6), (7), (9) and (11) of block 6. The necessity for this procedure will be evident from the following example.

Question.—During the reference period a sample household purchased only 20 gms. of green chillies (item 109 of block 6) the price of which is quoted in the market as Re. 0.50 per kilogram—what should be the local unit—gram or kilogram ?

Answer.—According to the procedure suggested above, the local unit should be 'kilogram' as the price of green chillies is quoted per kg. In that case, the entry under the column for 'quantity of cash purchase (col. 6)' is 0.20 kg. and that under the column for 'price per local unit (col 7)' is Re.0.50 (per kg.). If, however, 'gram' is chosen as local unit, then the entry under col. 6 becomes 10 grams and that under, col. 7 becomes Re. 0.0005 (per gram). Since there is no provision to record figures under col. 7 beyond two decimal places, this figure becomes Rs. 0.00 after rounding it off to two decimal places. It is clear, therefore, that no data for purchase price under col. 7 can be collected if 'gram' is chosen as the local unit.

8.6.6 Column 5 : number of standard units per local unit.—The number of standard units per local unit is to be given in this column. It has to be calculated. If the standard unit is a kilogram then the local unit will be required to be expressed in kilogram and entered in kilogram and entered under column 5. To obtain this, it will be necessary to determine the weight of one local unit in grams and divide it by 1000. In a majority of cases, the weight of one local unit in grams will be known. If not, this should be determined by the investigator by actually weighing a local unit of weight with the help of a balance using the metric system of weights. When the local unit is a volume measure, then the weight of the commodity equivalent to the local unit by volume will be determined in grams. If the standard unit is 'number' the number of units of the article contained in a local unit will be entered here. **IN ALL CASES, ENTRIES UNDER THIS COLUMN ARE TO BE MADE IN THREE DECIMAL PLACES.**

Example 1.—Suppose the weight of a local unit is 933 gms. Then if the standard unit is a kilogram (kg.) the entry in this column will be $933 \div 1000 = 0.933$.

It should be noted that when the standard unit is itself a unit of volume as also the local unit, both these units will have to be reduced to the volume of the same dimension (say cubic centimetres) to obtain this number

Example 2.—Suppose the local unit is a pint and the standard unit is a litre. Reducing both these units into cubic centimetres, it is seen that 1 pint=568 cc and 1 litre=1000 cc. Thus the number of standard units per local unit is obtained as $568 \div 1000 = 0.568$.

Example 3.—Suppose the local unit is a 'dozen' or 'a packet' (or 'bunch' or 'basket') of known units (say 1 single unit, or 20 or 50 or 100 units) then the number of standard units per local unit will be obtained as follows :

8.6.7 *Columns 6—8 : Cash purchase : quantity, price and value.*—These columns relate to quantity and value of cash purchase of the household and the purchase price during 30 days preceding the date of survey. Only such purchases as are made for non-productive purposes are to be considered. That is all purchases for household enterprise purposes are to be left out entirely. In case a purchase is both for productive and non-productive purposes, the part ascribable only to non-productive purpose should be taken.

8.6.8 The quantity of cash purchase should be entered under column 6 in terms of local units. In case data are already available in standard units in a locality the entries may be made directly in standard units. The corresponding entry under col. 5 will then be 1.000. The price (value per local unit) at which a particular commodity was purchased by the household should be entered under col. 7. It may so happen that a commodity may be purchased at different prices during the reference period. In such a case, the average price obtained by dividing the total value by the total quantity purchased should be mentioned under this column. The total value of purchase should be noted under col. 8.

Credit purchase.—A household may make its purchase on credit so that no payment is made by the household during the reference period towards such purchases. In that case the quantity of goods purchased during the reference period and the corresponding purchase price are to be accounted for as usual under cols. 6 and 7 respectively. But, value of the credit purchase should not be entered under col. 8 since no payment has been made during the reference period. If, however, the household makes payment towards its credit purchases made earlier than the prescribed reference period and the payment is effected during the reference period, then value of such credit purchases will be recorded under col. 8. The above mentioned instructions are applicable for credit purchases of items belonging to other blocks (blocks 7, 8 and 9) as well. (It will appear that there has been slight departure in the method of treatment of credit purchases in this schedule from that followed in schedule 1.0 in earlier rounds. The purpose envisaged in para 8.0.15 for an integrated enquiry renders this departure unavoidable). It follows that when a household makes payment (partly or wholly) towards its credit purchases made earlier than the prescribed reference period of 30 days and such payment is effected during the reference period, the value of such payment will have to be accounted for in the schedule. It is essential to account this value in the schedule by different items of credit purchase. If the allocation is not feasible by individual items it may be attempted by sub-groups of items for example item codes 22, 23, 24, 28, 29, 40, 47, 57, 69, 79, 88, 95, 102, 105, 115, 130, 135, 144, 151 or 165 of block 6, whichever will be the reporting items. In case where even this extent of allocation is not feasible, the entries may be made against the broad groups of items as given in the summary block 11.

A mere statement of facts that a payment was made during the reference period towards credit purchases or recording of lump-sum payment in the remarks block or elsewhere in the schedule will not serve any purpose.

The value of credit purchase and clarifications, the value of credit purchase will be recorded under column 8 of block 6, col. 9 of block 7, col. 3 of block 8, and col. 5 of block 9, if the payment is made during the reference period. In case of part payment, towards the purchase of a number of items within the period preceding the reference period or during the reference period and when allocation to various items purchased is not possible, it is desired that the same should be explained within an asterisk mark against the items, in the remarks block meant for investigator.

8.6.9 *Columns 9 and 10 : home-grown stock consumed.*—These columns relate to consumption out of home-grown stock. The quantity in local units and the corresponding imputed value of the commodities which the household, consumed for domestic purposes during the reference period out of the stock produced by itself will be entered in columns 9 and 10 respectively. For the procedure of imputation para 8.6.11 may be referred to.

8.6.10 *Columns 11 and 12 : total consumption.*—These columns relate to consumption of the household during the reference period. The consumption data should be strictly restricted to the non-productive domestic consumption of the household including that of the pet animals* if any. But consumption by livestock of the household is for productive enterprise and as such should not be included in the household consumption. Accounting should, however, be made of the livestock products like milk, meat, eggs, etc.,

*A distinction between the pet animals of the household and its livestock may be carefully noted. Pet animals are domestic animals which are not used for the household enterprise. Dog, cat, hare, birds like parrot, pigeon, peacock, etc., are the common examples. A livestock on the other hand, is a domestic animal used for enterprise of the households. Domestic cows, buffaloes, goats, sheep, pigs, poultry etc., and transport animals like horses, bullocks, mules, donkeys, camels, etc., usually form such livestock.

if obtained from them and consumed by the household. While recording entries for household consumption, care should be taken not to include any *transfer-payments* like loans advanced, charities, gifts, perquisites and other offerings. But any consumption out of similar *transfer* receipts of the household like borrowings, gifts, charities or perquisites received by the household, free collections etc., will have to be considered.

8·6·11 The quantity of total domestic consumption of the household will be entered under column 11 and its corresponding value, under column 12. Total domestic consumption will consist of consumption out of (i) monetary purchase, (ii) receipt in exchange of goods or services, (iii) home-grown stock and (iv) transfer receipts like gifts, charities, perquisites, loans, free collections etc. The quantities consumed out of (ii) & (iv) should be calculated at the average retail price prevailing in the locality during the reference period. The quantities consumed out of (iii) should be imputed by ex-farm (or ex-factory) price which is free from distributive cost or middleman's profit and other trade margins.

8·6·12 On ceremonial occasions some foodgrains (also items like clothing etc.) are offered to priests. Such items, if purchased by the household, will be accounted for under cols. 6—8 but should not be considered for cols. 11 and 12 as they are not consumed by the household. Imputed value of such offerings should be regarded as a part of payment towards priest's services and entered against item 46 (priest) of block 8.

Explanatory notes on the items

8·6·13 *Item 1, paddy.*—If paddy is purchased and consumed after husking, the entries should be made against paddy under the purchase columns (6—8). The corresponding entries of consumption should be made *not against* paddy but against rice (item 2) under the consumption columns 11 and 12. Cross marks (x) should be put against item 1 (paddy) for cols. 11 and 12. Consumption of paddy by per animals (pigeons etc.) but *not* by poultry (which is a livestock) may be shown under cols. 11 and 12.

8·6·14 *Item 2.*—Rice means clean or husked rice.

8·6·15 *Items 3—6.*—Rice products consist of items like moori, chira, khoi, lawa, rice powder etc., which are generally obtained by splitting, powdering, frying on sand, parching etc. Food preparations out of rice or powder such as boiled rice, pastries, cakes, sweets etc., should not be considered rice products. The proper place of entry for those items will be against items 124 (prepared sweets) or 129 (processed food—others), as the case may be.

8·6·16 *Item 7.*—Wheat represents whole grain.

8·6·17 *Item 8.*—Wheat ata consists of all powdered form of wheat like ata, maida (flour) etc.

8·6·18 *Item 9.*—Other wheat products include suji sewai and similar products.

8·6·19 *Item 10 (jowar), 12 (bajra), 14 (maize), 16 (barley), 18 (ragi), 20 (small millets*)* relate to whole grains where as items 11, 13, 15, 17, 19 & 21 relate to corresponding cereals products like ata (obtained by powdering) sattu (obtained by frying and powdering) and so on.

8·6·20 In case the cereals like wheat, jowar, bajra, maize, barley, ragi and small millets are not consumed as wholegrain, the entries corresponding to consumption of these cereals should not be stated against the lines for wholegrains of these items. In particular if wheat is purchased and wheat flour (ata, maida) is consumed the entries of PURCHASE should be shown against wheat (item 7) and those of CONSUMPTION against wheat flour (item 8).

8·6·21 *Item 24, other cereals—sub-total.*—This corresponds to the total of all cereals excluding rice and wheat.

8·6·22 *Item 27, gram products* relate to items like sattu (obtained by frying and powdering).

8·6·23 *Item 29, cereal substitutes* relate to items like tapioca, pea, sweet-potato, mahua, jackfruit seeds etc. which are often used to replace the consumption of cereals (and hence the name "cereal substitutes").

8·6·24 *Item 39, pulse products* relate to items like besan (powdered pulse) etc., prepared from any of the items 30—38.

8·6·25 *Item 41, milk (liquid)* relates to milk as obtained by milching cow, buffalo, goat and other livestock animals and milk bottles sold in market.

*small millets consist of sawan, cheena, kutki, Kodo and kangni.

8.6.26 *Items 43—46, milk products* are obtained by transforming milk by heating, churning or by adding chemicals like acid drops, fermenting agents etc. Ghee, butter, curd (dahi) casein (Chhena), buttermilk (ghol) etc., are the common examples. Sweetmeats like rosgullas, sandesh, peras etc. should not, however, be treated as milk products. These are actually the final food preparations out of milk. When milk is used by the household for final food preparations, the milk used will go against item 41 (milk liquid). But when milk is transformed into the milk products which are consumed by the household, the entries should be made against the items of milk products and not against item 41 (milk liquid). The actual quantity of such milk products should be recorded against appropriate items. The corresponding value of milk products will be the value of milk used. Evaluation of milk produced at home should be done at the rate at which a local producer sells his milk.

8.6.27 *Item 54, refined oil*.—"Refined oil" is intended to include any liquid vegetable oil which has been subjected to any or all of the refining process of neutralisation, bleaching and deodorisation, and thereby freed from the acidity, colour and odour respectively—usually associated with the relevant raw oil. The basic distinction between raw vegetable oils and refined oil is that the former are characterised by more or less deep colour and pronounced odour and taste which vary from oil to oil, whereas the latter viz., refined oil is, as a rule, colourless, odourless and tasteless and has a bland, water white appearance. 'Refined' oil is usually sold in container under the description "refined groundnut oil" or "refined cotton seed oil" or sometimes merely "refined vegetable oil" or even just "refined oil".

8.6.28 *Items 48—56, edible oil*.—Oil or oil seeds used exclusively for edible purposes should be considered in this block. Any oil used for toilet purpose should not be accounted for in this block but will go against item 21 of block 8.

8.6.29 *Item 96, vegetables, fruits and nuts—sub-total*.—As indicated in col. 2 of this block, this sub-total is to be built up from the entries against the sub-totals 79 (vegetables sub-total), 88 (fresh fruits sub-total) and 95 (dry fruits and nuts—sub-total). The procedure of entries will be as follows: First the items of vegetable sub-group will be entered and then vegetable sub-total (item 79) will be struck. If no item is reported in this sub-group, obviously no entry will come for items 70—79. Next, items of fresh fruits will be entered and the sub-total for fresh fruits (item 88) will be struck. This will be followed by items of dry fruits and nuts as well as its sub-total (item 95). *The important point to be noted is that entries corresponding to the sub-total item numbers 79, 88 and 95 will be necessary even if there is only one reporting item for each sub-group.*

The rules relating to the entries of other sub-totals like salt sub-total (item 105), spices sub-total (item 115), pan sub-total (item 135), tobacco sub-total (item 144) and drugs and intoxicants sub-total (item 151) will be on similar lines as stated above.

Supplementary sheet for block 6.—In case the number of blank lines provided in block 6 of schedule 16 fails to accommodate all the reporting items, the investigator may use the supplementary sheet for block 6 specially printed for the purpose.

Depending on the lines available, the main schedule will show one or two very important items, the total of all other items under 'others' and the sub-total covering the important items and 'others'. The supplementary sheet is intended to be used as working sheet to record the individual items which are reported and which, therefore, comprise the item 'others' under each sub-total.

The identification particulars of the sample household should be correctly and invariably filled in the space provided in the supplementary sheet.

8.6.30 *Item 97, sugar*: relates to only cane sugar crystals (particles) manufactured by factories.

8.6.31 *Items 101, sugar others*: consist of the rest of the varieties of cane sugar like bhoora, and other sugar or gur such as those obtained from palm or date juice.

8.6.32 *Item 121, drinking beverage (others)*: consist of other hot drinks like cocoa, bournvita, ovaltine etc., and cold drinks like soda, lemonade, cocacola, sherbet, fruit juices etc. For this item no standard unit is specified. The standard unit may be 'no. of cups' or 'number of tumblers' or 'number of bottles', whichever is applicable. If more than one kind of drinks occur here with different standard units, only value is to be recorded with an explanatory note.

8.6.33 *Item 122, biscuits and confectioneries* relate to prepared bread in addition to biscuits, cakes etc., prepared by bakeries and chocolates, toffees, lozenges etc.

8.6.34 *Item 125, cooked meals* should consist of cooked meals purchased from market (hotels, restaurants, canteens etc.). No entries are required for meals prepared at home and consumed by members or visitors of the household. Meals received by an employee's household as perquisites from an employer's household should be left out of account at the employee's household because these meals are already accounted for in the employer's household, not in the form meals but in terms of their constituent items like cereals, pulses, vegetables, edible oil, salt etc.

8.6.35 *Item 129, processed food* (others) consist of food preparations (other than those included under items 117—128 of the list) like snacks, tiffins, food packets and so on.

8.6.36 *Item 134, other ingredients for pan* will consist of catechu (kattidha), lime and the ingredients generally used in finished pan. Zarda, Kiman, surti and tobacco leaves etc., which are sometimes added in finished pan, are tobacco products and as such should not be included here. The proper place of entry of these tobacco products will be against item 138 (leaf tobacco) and 142 (zarda, kimam, surti) as the case may be.

8.7.0 *Block 7 : cash purchase and consumption of clothing.*—This block relates to all items of clothing, bedding and upholstery. All the columns in this block excepting col. 3 (type code) are similar to those in block 6. For the purpose of entry under the columns consumption for (cols. 12 and 13) only such items as are brought into MAIDEN USE (*i.e.*, used for the first time) during the reference period should be considered. Items purchased during the reference period or earlier but not brought into maiden use during the reference period should not be regarded as consumed during the reference period and thus should not be entered under these columns.

8.7.1 *Col. 3 type code.*—This code is used to specify the material (cotton, wool, silk etc.) of the cloth used in the clothing item. For cotton clothing, separate code numbers are provided for millmade, power-loom, handloom and khadi varieties, and for silk. The code numbers are printed in the schedule itself. Mixed woollen textures like cotton and wool or silk and wool should be included under type code 5 (wool). Other mixed stuff will go under code 8 (others).

Type code 6 in the schedule should read as code 6—art silk, rayon or any other synthetic textile.

8.7.2 *Col. 6, number of standard units per local unit.*—The standard unit used for measuring cloth is a METRE. For readymade garments, the standard unit NUMBER. To convert a local unit of measure into metre, its length should first be expressed in centimetres (by actually using a metric scale or tape) and then divided by 100. The result will be entered under this column in TWO places of decimals. For readymade garments for which the standard unit is a number, the same procedure as suggested in para 8.6.6 may be followed. In case of stocks, gloves etc., which are sold by pairs, the standard unit should be PAIR and not number.

8.7.3 It is important to note the following points regarding block 7.

- (a) Foam rubber cushions (dunlopillo type) meant for chairs, sofa or bed, holdalls, travelling bed rolls and floor matting (with carpets, durries and other materials) are outside the scope of block 7 and should be entered against items 10 or 11 of block 9, as the case may be.
- (b) Any cloth purchased for gift, charity, perquisites or for priest's offer will not be considered as consumed by the household, although it is a household purchase.
- (c) For readymade garments, quantity of consumption should be shown in terms of number and not in terms of metres. But when cloth is purchased in metres and garments are prepared out of it, the quantity of consumption in such cases should be expressed in metres.
- (d) When any garment is prepared at home by the members of the sample household, its value will be equal to the value of cloth only. No labour charge for preparation of the garment need be accounted for unless the sample household itself is running an enterprise in tailoring. In the latter case, the tailoring charge should be shown against item 45 (tailor) of block 8.

8.8.0 *Block 8—9 : expenditure (cash & kind) on miscellaneous goods and services and on durable goods for domestic use.*—For these blocks there is no separate concept of purchase and consumption as in the earlier blocks. The expenditure (in cash or kind) incurred on an item is only to be recorded, remembering that such expenditure should not relate to productive enterprise of the household. Expenditure in kind, if any, should be evaluated at locally prevalent retail rates. For block 8, purchase will mean only first hand purchase. Items are mostly self-explanatory. Explanatory notes are supplied only on some selected items.

8.8.1 *Item 48, other consumer services.*—This item will stand for the residual part of consumer services already enumerated as items 39—47 and will generally consist of services of lawyer, driver, coachmen, cobbler, carpenter, blacksmith, goldsmith, masons, bricklayers and other unskilled labour.

8.8.2 *Items 50—59.*—Conveyances relate to transportation costs. The expenditure incurred on account of journeys undertaken and/or transportation of goods made by railway, bus, steamer, motor car (or taxi), motor cycle, bicycle, rickshaw, horsecab, bullock cart, hand cart, porter and other unspecified types of conveyances. Actual fares paid are to be recorded. In case of conveyances owned by the sample households only maintenance charge is to be recorded. This should mainly consist of running cost of fuel (petrol, gasolene, mobil oil) and animal feed (gram, fodder). Other components of maintenance charge like garage rent, driver's and cleaner's salaries, servicing etc. will be accounted for elsewhere in appropriate places in this block.

8.8.3.— When a household utilises its conveyance both for household enterprise as well as for non-productive domestic consumption purposes, the components of maintenance charges as detailed above will have to be apportioned on the basis of extent of use of such vehicles for the latter purposes, the procedure of filling in the entries remaining the same. The extent of use should, however, be determined primarily by considering the number of miles actually run during the reference period. The number of hours of engagement or number of days of engagement may be taken as next approximations. In cases when none of these procedures can be adopted, as for example, when the animal or vehicle remains idle during the whole or part of the reference period, the allocation may be done on the basis of normal use, the word 'normal' however referring to a period of reference larger than 30 days previous to the date of enquiry.

8.8.4 Items 60—64. — *Ceremonials* : For the purpose of this block, ceremonials may refer to birth, death, marriage and other important occasions of life. Only expenditure incurred towards particular goods required to perform the ceremonial rites should be accounted against these items. Expenditure on other accounts namely those on feast and entertainment, decorations, services of priests or preceptors, barbers, other labour etc. are to be accounted for elsewhere in appropriate places in the schedule.

8.8.5 Items 65—68 : *rent etc.*—Consumer rent consists of rent for residential houses, residential land, garage for private vehicles and rent for other consumer goods like furniture, electric fans, utensils etc. hired for domestic use and hire charges for decorations on ceremonial occasions. Rent for owned houses used for residential purposes need not be imputed.

8.8.6 Item 69.— *consumer taxes and cesses* consist of licence fees for keeping gun, radio, cycle, motor car etc. and other consumer taxes like the municipal taxes, road taxes etc. but do not include income tax.

8.8.7 Item 70.— *miscellaneous goods and services, sub-total* gives the aggregate of all items entered in this block and should be arrived at from the sub-totals 1 & 2 shown in the schedule.

The sub-totals of items are defined as follows :

Items 1—4	constitute the item	5, amusement sub-total
Items 6—10	„ „	11, education sub-total

The procedure of making entries corresponding to these sub-totals has already been explained in para 8.6.29.

When an employee (Government or non-government) is required to undertake tour or journey on official purpose, he is allowed certain travelling allowances and daily or halting allowances to cover the cost of such journey. The expenditure incurred on such a journey is therefore not a part of the domestic consumer expenditure of the employee and will not find place in the consumer expenditure blocks 6—11 of schedules or blocks 7 & 8 of schedules 17. These expenses incidental to travel will include the conveyance charges like rail, bus, steamer or plane fare, porter charges for carrying luggage, boarding and lodging charges and also some expenses on non-food articles, incurred in connection with the journey. Although in practice, it may be difficult to make a clear-cut division of the expenses met out of the employees' T.A. and his own income, an attempt should be made to separate out the expenses on Government account (or in the non-Government institutional account) from the domestic consumer expenditure of the employee.

It should also be noted that the receipt of travelling allowance (whether fixed or *ad hoc*) by the employee does not form a part of employee's income. Hence, there will be the entry corresponding to such a receipt, if any, during the reference period, in block 15.1 of schedule 16 or in block 10.1 of schedule 17.

Query.—For a household 11 lines have been used from codes 1 to 36 under sub-total (1), and the remaining codes are under sub-totals (2). In col. (3) against sub-total (1) if the figures of codes 5, 11, 17 and 23 will be given or those item codes (1 to 36) entered under sub-total I will be given.

Answer.—Sub-total I is the total of all items entered just above it and may be from items 1 to 69. Sub-total 2 is the total of the items entered just above it but not including the items already included under sub-total I. These sub-totals are provided only to aid computation of figure for item 70 (block sub-total). Since 33 lines are provided to record only the reporting items from a total of 69 items *i.e.* record only the reporting items from a total of 69 items (*i.e.* 60 individual items and 9 sub-totals), there does not seem any difficulty in entering individual items besides their sub-totals in this block. From the first sentence of the para 8.8.7 of the instructions to field workers, vol. I, kindly delete the part and should be arrived at from the sub-totals 1 and 2 shown in the schedule, since it may create confusion.

8.9.0 *Block 9, Expenditure (cash & kind) on durable goods for domestic use.*—The information relating to the first hand purchase, second hand purchase and the corresponding purchase price together with the cost of raw materials required for constructions and repairs all during the reference period (last 30 days) are required in this block. The items considered are all kinds of durable goods not considered elsewhere in the schedule and are self explanatory. The sub-totals of items are defined as follows.

Items 1—12	constitute the item 13, furniture sub-total
Items 14—19	„ „ 20, musical instruments sub-total
Items 21—24	„ „ 25, ornaments sub-total
Items 26—34	„ „ 35, utensils sub-total
Items 36—39	„ „ 40, footwear sub-total
Items 41—60	„ „ 61, other equipments sub-total

The procedure of making entries corresponding to these sub-totals has already been explained in para 8.6.29.

8.9.1 *col. (3)-(5) : first hand purchase.*—These columns relate to first hand purchase during the period. Col. (3) gives the actual number purchased during the reference period and col. (5) the corresponding value of purchase. Col. (4) refers to actual purchase price *i.e.* value of purchase of one unit of the article in question. If there are more than one unit purchased during the reference period the entry under col. (4) will relate to the average price and will be obtained by dividing the entry under col. (5) by that under col. (3).

8.9.2 *col. (6) relates to the cost of raw materials* required for construction, assemblage or repair of durable goods, if any, possessed by the household. The corresponding service charge, if any, is to be noted against item 48 (other consumer services) of block 8.

8.9.3 *col. (7) is the total* of cols. (5) and (6)

8.9.4 *cols. (8)–(10) relate to second hand purchase* of the household during the reference period. The procedure of entry under these columns are similar to that for the first hand purchases detailed in para 8.9. It is to be noted that entries corresponding to second hand purchase of articles covered in blocks 7 & 8, should be lumped up and entered in this block against item 59 (other durables), as there is no scope for such entries in the former blocks.

8.9.5 Entries relating to purchase of pet animals or transport animals used exclusively for non-productive domestic purposes may be lumped up and put against item 59 (other durables) following the old convention of sch 1.0, consumer expenditure of earlier rounds.

8.9.6 It is to be noted that for item 60 (residential building or land), expenditure incurred towards maintenance, repair or improvement need only be considered. The cost of materials used should go under col. (6) and the service charge of masons and other labour etc. against item 48 (other consumer services) of block 8. No entry of value of purchase of item 60 (residential building or land) whether first hand or second hand, should be considered as this is a capital expenditure.

8.10.0 *Block 10 : inventory of SELECTED items* as on the date of survey.

8.10.1 *Cols. (3) and (4) relate to the number and value* respectively of the consumer durables listed in col. (2) possessed by the household as on the date of survey. The value should refer to purchase value if that is purchased during 30 days preceding the date of survey. In all other cases, the value should be imputed. That value which the article in question will fetch in the locality if sold on the date of survey, should be entered. For item 8 (books & journals) put crossed under column 3 (number processed) and col. 4 (value in Rs. 0.00) as no information required is for the item.
