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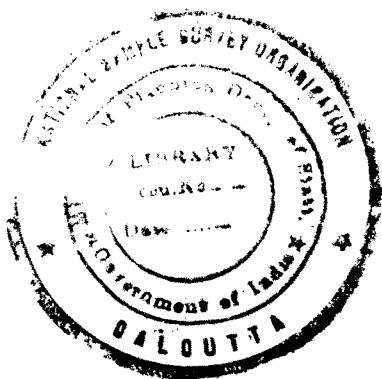
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## FOREWORD

The National Sample Survey (NSS) started in 1950, was reorganised in 1970 by bringing the field, Technical and Data Processing wings under the organisation named the National Sample Survey Organisation (NSSO). The 25th round of NSS (July 1970-June 1971) was the first round of survey to be carried out under the new set-up. The Governing Council of the NSSO which was responsible for deciding the programme of enquiry took into consideration the great urgency and relevance of a study on the economic conditions of the weaker sections of the rural population, and resolved to devote the 25th round of NSS mainly for this purpose. For the purpose of the survey, the weaker sections were defined to be the lowest 10 per cent of the cultivating households, and the households having no cultivated holding whatsoever except that households from both these strata which might have derived their major income, more or less on a regular basis, from sources like self-employment in trading, manufacture, mechanised transport, professions and also from salaried employment or from rent were excluded. Thus the rural households selected for investigation were (i) the small cultivator households whose main stay was farming a small holding and wage labour, and (ii) non-cultivating wage earner households having no other means of livelihood.

A comprehensive enquiry on the earning and consumption expenditure of the households and their indebtedness and assets was carried out. Besides, information on the activity pattern of the individual members of the households was collected. In addition, as a special feature of this enquiry, a number of questions were asked to ascertain how the small cultivator households would appraise the difficulties and improvement possibilities of their farm businesses and also the extent and nature of response of these small cultivator and wage earner households to employment opportunities outside the village of residence.

Results of the survey are being brought out in four parts covering different aspects namely :—

- (a) Time disposition and wage rate.
- (b) Annual household earnings, indebtedness, cultivated holding and other assets.
- (c) Consumer Expenditure.
- (d) Problems and prospects.

Reports on these aspects are presented for all sub-rounds combined. However, the report on (a) have also been issued by sub-round (there are 4 sub-rounds each of 3 months duration) which make available data on activity pattern and wage rate for different periods of the year.

The present report, the draft of which was brought out in May 1975, relates to results regarding earnings, indebtedness, cultivated holdings and assets of the weaker section households, obtained from pooled estimates of all the four sub-rounds, covering the period July 1970 to June 1971.

The sample design and schedule of enquiry were prepared by the Survey Design and Research Division (SDRD) of the NSSO. Field work of the survey was done by the Field Operations Division (FOD) in all states excepting West Bengal and Bombay city were the survey work carried out by the field staff of the Indian Statistical Institute (subsequently merged with the FOD, NSSO). Processing of the Data was done by the Data Processing Division (DPD) of the NSSO.

CHAPTER ONE

## 1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 *Objective\**: The National Sample Survey Organisation undertook an enquiry into the economic conditions of the weaker section of rural population of the country in its twentyfifth round of survey. With this object in view household schedules on economic condition of the small cultivators (schedule 16.1) and the wage-earners (schedules 16.2) were canvassed in the rural areas of the country. The period of the survey was from 1st July 1970 to 30th June 1971.

1.2 *Definition of the weaker section*: Weaker section households for the purpose of the survey were composed of two sets of households viz. (i) small cultivator households' and (ii) non-cultivating wage earner households. 'Small cultivator households' were defined as the lowest ten per cent of the households having some cultivated land either owned or leased in, during the reference period July 1969—June 1970; and 'non-cultivating wage earner households' were defined as households having no cultivated land whatsoever during the same reference period. Further, any of the households from either of these strata which might have derived its major income during the reference period, more or less on a regular basis, from sources like self-employment in trading, manufacture, mechanised transport, professions and also from salaried employment or from rent, was to be excluded. The rural households thus classified and selected were to constitute two more or less homogeneous groups viz. (a) the small cultivator households whose main stay was farming a small holding (size of which is not the same nor is it fixed throughout the country) and, may be, some wage labour, and (b) non-cultivating wage earner households whose main stay was wage labour and who had no cultivated land.

1.3 *Items of information*: Information collected on income, expenditure, assets and indebtedness from both the types of households were same in nature and for small cultivators, households information on cultivated holding, particulars of the type of tenure and production from agriculture, was collected in addition. The detailed items of information collected were as follows: (i) area of land cultivated (ii) area of land owned and leased in (iii) state of record of tenancy rights and nature of dispute on land (iv) gross receipt

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\*The subject coverage and sample design of the twenty-fifth round of the survey was finalised by the National Sample Survey Organisation Governing Council (NSSO-GC). The technical work relating to details of the sample design, sample selection, design of schedules, writing of instructions and training of field staff had been done by the Indian Statistical Institute (ISI). The field work of this survey was done by the Directorate of National Sample Survey subsequently renamed as National Sample Survey Field Operation Division (NSS-FOD), in all the states excepting in West Bengal and Bombay City where the survey work was done by the ISI Field Office (subsequently merged with NSS-FOD),



from agriculture, livestock and enterprises relating to animal husbandry and forestry (v) net receipt from other sources viz., enterprise other than agriculture; wage income; hire charges of draught animal, cart and agricultural implements etc., remittances and other transfer receipts, and receipt from other non-gainful activities, (vi) disbursement on account of farm activities (vii) inventory and transaction of assets and (viii) indebtedness. Information on 'credit needs' was also collected from small cultivator households only. Besides these, details of household consumer expenditure, and employment and certain other related items of information were also collected, the nature and details of which are covered in separate reports.

1.4 *Reference period* : The information on cultivated land, receipts and disbursements on farm accounts, receipts from other sources, and assets covered in this report, were collected for last 365 days proceeding the date of survey. Data on 'loan outstanding' was referred to the date of survey and on loan transacted was collected for a period of one year proceeding the date of survey. Household consumer expenditure referred to last 30 days.

1.5. *Coverage* : The geographical coverage of the survey in the twenty-fifth round for the above mentioned survey was the rural area of the Indian Union except NEFA, Ladakh district of Jammu and Kashmir State, Mizo Hills (Lushai) district in Assam State, Pul and Samari tehsils of district of Surguja and Birjapur, Dantewara and Kanta tehsils of district of Bastar of Madhya Pradesh Sironcha and Gadh Chirohi tehsils of district Chanda of Maharashtra, rural areas in Nagaland, Longai and Kanchanpur in Dharmnagar sub-division and Dumbennangar in Amarpur sub-division of the Union Territories of Tripura, the Union Territories of Andaman and Nicobar Islands and Laccadive, Minicoy and Amindivi Islands.

1.6. *Sampling Design* : A self weighting sampling design at the State level was laid out. The design is mainly a stratified two stage one, the first stage and the second stage units being a village and a household respectively. The sample villages were selected circularly systematically with equal probability and then the sample households were selected linear systematically with a random start in each sample village. The sample was so selected as to form two independent and interpenetrating net work of sub-samples. The field work was organised in 4 sub-round and the period of survey was 1st July 1970 to 30th June 1971. In the survey out of 8714 sample villages 12522 sample households of small cultivators and 8804 of wage earners households were surveyed. For obtaining more efficient estimates for states they were assigned on equal sample size for collection of data on a matching basis.

1.7. *Estimates* : In this report pooled estimates of all sub-rounds are presented for All India in detail and of some important items for States. Estimates of all items presented in tables for All India will be brought out for each state and each region within a State subsequently. The estimates presented are based on data collected through *Central Sample* only.

1.8 *Field Work* : The responsibility of collection of data of the Central Sample rested on the Directorate of the Field Operation Division of the National Sample Survey Organisation, Government of India in all States and Union Territories except in West Bengal and Bombay City where the work was entrusted to the field unit of the Indian Statistical Institute. State Statistical Bureaus or Directorates of Statistics canvassed the schedules for the State samples allocated for each State on a matching basis.

19. *Arrangement of Tables*: In the present report Tables in Appendices I and II refer to All India basic tables for small cultivator and wage earner households. In Appendix III state-wise estimates have been presented with respect to some of the items contained in tables of Appendix I and II. In Appendix III some estimates for State and All India are presented which have been derived from Tables in Appendix I, II and III. The digit on the left-hand side of decimal in the table number stands for the number of the Appendix and those on its right indicate the serial number of the table within the Appendix. The Tables of Appendix I contain information on area of cultivated land, area owned and leased-in, area irrigated, state of record of tenancy rights of leased-in land, nature of dispute on record of tenancy rights of leased-in land and credit need of small cultivator household and the tables of Appendix II show estimated relating to income, assets and indebtedness of small cultivators and wage earner households at the national level.

## CHAPTER TWO

### SOME CONCEPT AND DEFINITIONS

2.1 Some of the concepts and definitions adopted in the survey on economic conditions of small cultivator household and that of wage earner household are given below :

2.2 *Household* : A group of persons normally living together and taking food from a common kitchen constituted a household. However as special cases, (i) the inmates of a mess, hostel, boarding and lodging house, hotel, orphanage, vagrant house were treated as single member households, and (ii) inmates of jail, hospital, nursing homes etc. however were excluded, Floating population *i.e.* persons without any normal residence vagrants etc. were also not listed for survey.

2.3 *Land cultivated* : This was defined as the area of land cultivated by the household in the reference period. The net area sown or planted with crops, vegetables, orchards and plantation crops including land used for horticulture, nursery, forestry and logging was treated as cultivated land. The current fallow was included as cultivated land.

2.4 *Salaried employment* : Employment on a regular salary basis (monthly, fortnightly or weekly) in the public sector institutions, schools, hospitals, health centres, industrial or in any other establishments—private or public etc. was termed as salaried employment.

2.5 *Adult and child* : Person below 15 years of age on the date of survey was considered as 'child' and those who attained the age of 15 years or exceeded it were considered as 'adult'.

2.6 *Earners* : A person who worked in his own farm or non-farm enterprise as self-employed or participated in others' farm or non-farm enterprise for wage or salary during the reference period was treated as an 'earner'. Household member who worked as unpaid helper in household farm or non-farm enterprise was also considered an 'earner'.

2.7 *Land owned* : A plot of land was considered as 'owned' by the household if any member of the household had the right of permanent heritable possession with or without right to transfer title on the date of survey. A plot of land which was leased out on the date of survey without losing the right of permanent heritable possession was also accounted as owned. But while accounting for cultivated land owned land leased out for cultivation was not accounted against the owner household but was accounted for in the household that leased in the land for cultivation.

2.8 *Irrigated land* : A plot of land cultivated during last one year ending on the date of survey was defined as irrigated if it was provided with water from sources like canals, wells, tubewells etc. other than rain water at any point of time during last one year.

2.9 *Net income from farm* : Net income of farmer's household was gross income obtained from farm produce less the cost incurred on account of it during the same reference period.

2.10 *Net income from other sources*: It included net income. (*i.e.* gross income less cost incurred on its account) from (i) self-employment in manufacturing, trading, transport, mining and construction industries, (ii) professions and liberal arts, (iii) wage income from agricultural and non-agricultural activities, (iv) the hiring out of draught animals, carts and agricultural implements, (v) property *viz.*, on account of rent of land, building, machineries etc., interest against loan, dividend from shares etc., (vi) remittances and other transfer receipts like gifts etc., (vii) non-gainful activities *e.g.* begging etc.

2.11 *Assets*: Physical assets included land, building, tools and implements, machinery, transport equipment, furniture and fittings and other fixed assets to be used for household enterprise. Financial assets included shares, bonds etc. Any other assets for domestic use was excluded.

2.12 *Indebtedness*: For this purpose all types of loans short, medium or long term were taken into account. These loans included all cash and kind loans taken for enterprise, as well as for domestic purposes. Besides, trader's credit, credit purchase for enterprise, fees to be paid for professional services like those of doctors, lawyers etc. and 'hand loan' *i.e.* interest free loan taken from relatives or neighbours generally to be paid back within a short period of time were also included.

CHAPTER THREE  
SUMMARY OF RESULTS

Section (i) — Introduction

3.1 An account of the different aspects of economic condition of the weaker section households in rural India has been presented in this chapter. The two sets of population of the rural areas *viz.* small cultivator and wage earner households comprise the weaker section according to this survey. The size and pattern of income and expenditure and the extent of indebtedness of an average household belonging to this category which are shown here, will be important indicators of the economic condition of such a household. Information on the size of cultivated holding, nature of tenancy and record of land rights in respect of land leased in, and some related information have also been presented for small cultivator households.

3.2 The estimated number of weaker section households covered by the enquiry came to about 14 million for the country as a whole. Of this the non-cultivating wage-earner households comprised 10.4 million and the small cultivator households were 3.8 million. In terms of percentage of the estimated number of total rural households as obtained from the 25th round NSS, the weaker section households constitute nearly 20 per cent. State-wise percentage of small cultivator and wage-earner households to total rural households are given in table (1) as follows.

3.3 It is seen that for Andhra Pradesh, Gujarat, Haryana, Maharashtra, Mysore, Punjab, Tamil Nadu, West Bengal and Pondicherry, the percentage of weaker section households to total rural households is higher than the all-India average of nearly 20 per cent. In West Bengal and Tamil Nadu it is higher by 50 per cent or more over that of All India. In Gujarat, Maharashtra, Punjab, Mysore and Andhra Pradesh, weaker section households constituted 25 to 28 per cent of the total rural households in the respective state which are higher than the All India estimate, while the percentage of weaker section household in Haryana is quite close to the all-India estimate of 20 per cent of all rural households belonging to weaker section households was found to be the highest of all, states *viz.* about 52 per cent of the total rural households. For three States *viz.*, Bihar, Orissa and Kerala, the proportion of weaker section households appears to be rather low when viewed against the fact that these states are known to have much higher proportion of rural labour households. The low percentage *viz.* 16 for Bihar and Orissa and 11 for Kerala in the present enquiry, may be due to the reason that in these states a relatively larger number of households which had either small cultivated land or a good number of wage earners as household members, were excluded from the purview of the survey, as they had the major income from some self-employment or salaried employment.

3.4 It will be interesting to examine the composition of the weaker section households as small cultivator and wage-earner households in different states. The percentage composition for some selected states is presented in table (2). In Andhra Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, West Bengal, Maharashtra, Haryana and Punjab the non-cultivating wage-earner households are found to be either equal to or more than 80 per cent of the total weaker section households in each of these states. Uttar Pradesh and Mysore rank a little lower than Assam the above mentioned states with percentages as 7 and 77 respectively for the wage-earner households. In the Eastern sector, barring West Bengal, three other states, *viz.*, Assam, Bihar and Orissa, also had the percentages of wage-earner households comparatively high *viz.* 60 to 65. Of the four Southern states given in the table, all, except Kerala, had quite a high proportion of wage-earner households. In Northern India, Punjab, Haryana and Uttar Pradesh were found to be quite different, in respect of the composition of weaker section households, from other two states of the region *viz.* Rajasthan and Jammu & Kashmir whose percentages of small cultivator households to weaker section households were as high as 65 and 77 as against 12, 20 and 22 in the former states respectively.

Section (ii)—Cultivated area and related information for the small-cultivator households.

3.5 In the following paragraphs, information obtained regarding cultivated area, type of tenure, record of land rights and credit needs of the small cultivator households exclusively have been discussed, followed by a discussion on a few selected estimates. *viz.* earning, consumer expenditure and indebtedness of both small cultivator and wage-earner households.

3.6 *Percentage distribution of households by size of cultivated holdings:* Information on area of land cultivated during one year ending on date preceding of the date of survey was collected from each sample household belonging to small cultivator group. This area of land included land owned and land leased in. If a household has leased out a piece of land owned by him then information on this piece of land has been accounted against the household which has leased in the land. A table showing percentage distribution of households by size of cultivated area is given hereby.

3.7 It is seen from the table that about 97 per cent of households had cultivated area less than 5 acres, 88 per cent less than 2.50 acres, 77 per cent less than 1.50 acres, 64 per cent less than 1 acre and 45 per cent less than 0.50 acres. Thus on all-India basis it is observed that only a small fraction of the population of cultivator households belonging to weaker section, cultivated more than 5 acres of land. And while studying the economic condition of these households it should be borne in mind that nearly 88 per cent of such household did not cultivate even 2.50 acres of land. About one-third of such households, cultivated land between 0.10 and 0.49 acres and about one-fifth was having cultivated area between half an acre and more but less than one acre. Another one-third cultivated land between 1.00 acres and more but less than 2.50 acres of land. A little less than one eighth of such households cultivated less than 1.10 acres of land.

3.8 Percentage distribution of estimated number of small cultivator households (table 3.1, Appendix 3) by size of cultivated holding varies greatly from state to state. In Kerala most of the households reported cultivated holdings below 0.50 and rest below 1.50 acres. Three states *viz.*, Bihar, West Bengal and Manipur belonging to eastern region of the country reported 95 per cent or more of households as having cultivated land less than 1.50 acres. In 3 other states *viz.*, Assam, Orissa and Tripura such percentages were 85, 91 and 93 respectively. In two of the states *viz.*, Andhra Pradesh and Tamil Nadu of Southern India other than Kerala, and Pondicherry where no household did cultivate land equal to or

more than 1.50 acres nearly 95 percent of small cultivator households respectively reported less than 1.50 acres of cultivated land per household. In Mysore however, percentage of households reporting less than 1.50 acres of cultivated land was as low as 53 percent and was this was lowest for all the states of the south. In the Western part of the country, all small cultivator households of state Goa, Daman and Diu had cultivated land less than 1.50 acres where as in Madhya Pradesh nearly 67 percent, in Gujarat nearly 53 percent and in Maharashtra nearly 50 percent of small cultivator households cultivated land below 1.50 acres. In Northern India, Punjab and Haryana showed 68 and 57 percents respectively of small cultivator households as having cultivated land between 1.00 and 4.99 acres. These two states again had 13 and 9 percent of households respectively cultivating between 5.00 and 7.49 acres. Other Northern States like Uttar Pradesh and Rajasthan had quite a large proportion of households reporting cultivated land below 1.50 acres.

**3.9 Area Cultivated :** On an average a small cultivator household in the country as a whole cultivated an area of 1.08, with 0.91 acres of owned land and 0.17 acres of leased in land during the reference year (table 1.2, Appendix I). While accounting for owned and leased in area cultivated per reporting household it is seen that on an average cultivated area owned per reporting households was 1.01 acres and that of 'Leased-in' area was 1.03 acres.

**3.10** From Table (3.2) of Appendix 3 it is seen that among the states Kerala was found to have the lowest cultivated holding of 0.1 acre per small cultivator household. In the eastern sector, West Bengal and Bihar had on the average 0.4 acre, Orissa 0.6 acre and Assam reported to have a little less than 1.0 acre. In Northern India the average size of cultivated area for Uttar Pradesh was reported to be nearly 0.8 acre, whereas Punjab and Haryana reported 2.5 and 2.4 acres respectively per small cultivator household. In the Southern zone, Tamil Nadu had 0.6 acre, Andhra Pradesh 0.8 acre and Mysore 1.6 acres. In Gujarat of the Western part of the country the average cultivated holding of a small cultivator household was recorded as nearly 2.0 acres, while in Maharashtra and Madhya Pradesh these were nearly 1.9 and 1.4 acres respectively.

**3.11 State-wise estimate of owned and leased-in area cultivated :** On an examination of the state-wise estimates of owned, leased in and total area of cultivated land per small cultivator household from Table (3.2) of Appendix 3 it is seen that area owned was greater than leased-in area for all the states when averaged over all small cultivator households of the state. In Rajasthan area cultivated per small cultivator household was highest of all states, *viz.* 3.44 acres out of which 3.00 acres were owned and rest (0.44 acres) was leased in. Area cultivated per small cultivator household was lowest in Kerala *viz.* 0.10 acres comprising of 0.07 acres of owned land and 0.03 acres of leased in land. Again, it is seen from the same table that in Andhra Pradesh, Assam, Bihar, Haryana, Jammu & Kashmir, Kerala, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Punjab, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal of the major states leased-in cultivated area per household where only the reporting household were considered than owned area cultivated per small cultivator households having owned land. Among the major states, difference between leased-in and owned area cultivated per reporting household was found to be the highest in Maharashtra and lowest in Kerala. Haryana and Punjab, reporting 1.98 and 2.01 acres of owned area cultivated per household having owned land was found to have 2.42 and 2.36 acres respectively, of leased-in area cultivated per small cultivator households having leased-in land. In West Bengal on the other hand a small cultivator household having leased-in land had cultivated 0.72 acres of leased-in land while only 0.33 acres of owned land was cultivated by small cultivator households reporting owned land. In Bihar the average cultivated leased-in area per household exceeded that of owned cultivated area by 0.03 acres only. In Orissa, however, area owned per reporting household was found to be the same as that of leased-in area and each was equal to 0.57 acres. Cultivation of 'owned' land per reporting household in Gujarat, Mysore, Rajasthan and Tamil Nadu was on the other hand more than that of leased-in land.



3.12 *Irrigated area*: According to the results of this survey as seen from Table (1.3) of Appendix I, on an average a small cultivator household in the rural area of the country had reported having irrigated 0.28 acres out of 1.08 acres of cultivated land through canal, wells etc. For households reporting irrigation of any kind, the all-India average area under irrigation came to 0.80 acres. For households reporting irrigated area of land and having cultivated area of 5.00 acres and more the average irrigated area was between 3.42 and 3.59 acres. Households having cultivated land less than 1.50 acres were found to have irrigated areas ranging between 0.03 and 0.98 acres.

3.13 Table (4) below shows of percentage of area irrigated for small cultivator households, by size class of cultivated holdings. It is observed that on an average nearly 26 percent of area cultivated by small cultivated households received facility of irrigation. The percentage of area cultivated with irrigation facilities was found to increase with the increase in size of area cultivated upto the level of 0.49 acre and thereafter it again declined and the percentage of area irrigated varied between 24 to 25 for cultivated land size 1.50 acres to 7.50 acres. The percentage of area irrigated was highest (42 percent) for such households as had cultivated area of size 0.10 acre to 0.49 acre.

3.14 *Percentage of estimated number of small cultivator households with irrigated land at the all-India and state level*: It is seen from Table (5) that of the small cultivator households in the rural areas of the country only 35 percent *i.e.* nearly one-third of all small cultivator households of the country did irrigate their land either wholly or partly. In Punjab about 80 percent small cultivator households had irrigated land. Uttar Pradesh and Haryana of North India had about 70 and 64 percent of such households respectively with irrigated land while in Jammu & Kashmir it was 45 percent. On the contrary in the Eastern sector of the country it is seen that in states like West Bengal, Assam and Orissa 12 to 15 percent of small cultivator households had irrigated land. Bihar however showed a higher percentage (28 percent). In Western India, Madhya Pradesh and Maharashtra showed that about 18 and 22 percent of small cultivator households respectively had irrigated land, where as in Gujarat it was 55 percent. In Southern sector, Tamil Nadu and Andhra Pradesh had about 50 percent of small cultivator households with irrigated land where as Mysore and Kerala showed that only 18 and 9 percent of these households respectively had the irrigation facilities,

3.15 *Percentage distribution of small cultivator households by type of cultivated holding*: On the basis of the table (2) given in the Appendix (I) small cultivator households have been divided into these groups viz., (i) households with owned land only (ii) households with 'leased-in' land only and (iii) households with both owned and leased-in land. At the all-India level it is seen from Table (6) below that among the small cultivator households, only 11 percent had cultivation exclusively on leased-in land, taking into consideration the households having both owned and leased-in land (which was 6 percent of all small cultivator households) it is seen that 17 percent of small cultivator households had leased-in land and the rest 83 percent reported cultivation on owned land exclusively. On an examination of the same percentage distribution for different states it is seen that a little less than or a little over 6 percent of small cultivator households in Andhra Pradesh, Jammu & Kashmir, Maharashtra, Mysore and West Bengal, among the major states, had reported cultivation only on 'leased-in' land. And taking into account of households that had both owned and leased-in land, the same states reported about 10 percent of such households, which was below the all-India average. About 17 and 11 percent of small cultivator households of Punjab and Uttar Pradesh respectively cultivated with leased-in land only. The percentage increased to 35 for Punjab and 22 for Uttar Pradesh, when households that cultivated on both owned and leased-in land were also taken into consideration. Haryana and Kerala had more than 20 percent of small cultivator households with leased-in land only. And by including households which had both owned and leased-in land the percentages were found to be 29 in Bihar 37 in Haryana and 24 in Kerala. Gujarat had less than 1 percent of small cultivator households which had only leased-in land and almost same percentage of households was having both owned and leased-in land.

3.16 *Percentage of area cultivated as owned and leased in*: From Table (7) it is seen that 84 percent of area cultivated by small cultivator households on an All-India basis, was 'owned' by the households and 16 percent was 'leased-in'. Andhra Pradesh, Gujarat, Jammu & Kashmir, Maharashtra, Mysore, Orissa, Rajasthan and Tamil Nadu had reported percentage of 'owned' area cultivated to be greater than the All-India percentage Assam, Bihar, Haryana, Kerala, Madhya Pradesh, Punjab, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal showed 'leased-in' area to be more than 16 percent of the total cultivated land of the state. In Haryana and Punjab percentage of leased-in area was as large as 37 and 33 percent of cultivated land, and on the other hand Gujarat had less than one percent of land cultivated as 'leased-in'.

3.17 *Type of 'leased-in' land* : Percentage of total number of small cultivator households that had 'leased-in' cultivated land or non-cultivating land or both and percentage of leased-in area by type of lease have been presented in table (8). It is seen that for the country as a whole, almost 62 percent 'leased-in' area of the small cultivators were held on crop share basis. Remaining of the 'leased-in' areas were evenly distributed between two types of leased-in land viz. on basis of (i) cash rent and (ii) other terms. From Table (8) it is also seen that 50 percent of small cultivator households having leased-in land had the lease on crop share basis, whereas 16 and 37 percent of them leased-in on cash rent basis and other basis respectively. It may be noted that since a household might have more than one type of leased-in land the estimate of households by type of lease contained a household as many times as it appeared against different lease-in types. Whereas the estimate of total number of households having leased-in land was obtained by taking a household only once even if the household had land under more than one term of 'lease-in'.

3.18 Percentage of small cultivator households having leased-in land and the leased in area by type of lease have been shown in Table (9) for some selected states where leasing system of land has been found to be prevalent. It is seen from Table (9) that 72 and 82 percent of the households having leased-in land in Haryana and West Bengal respectively did cultivation in 82 and 88 percent of the leased-in areas as share croppers. In the state of Tamil Nadu 63 percent of the small cultivation households cultivated 58 percent of area on share cropping basis. In the State of Andhra Pradesh, Bihar, Maharashtra, Mysore, Punjab & Uttar Pradesh 52 to 59 percent of the households cultivated 57-73 percent of the leased-in area on crop share basis.

3.19 In most of the major states the percentage of households leasing in land on cash rent basis was found to be much lower than that of households leasing in on crop sharing basis. In Punjab however nearly 36 percent of 'lease' small cultivator households were found to have cultivated 35 percent of leased-in area on payment of rent in cash. In the remaining states as shown in Table (9) the percentage of households with leased in land owned paying rent in cash varied between 5 to 25.

3.20 System of leasing in land for cultivation on such terms as are not conforming to the systems mentioned earlier viz. share cropping and cash payment of rent was also reported. Information regarding the exact nature of these terms covered under category 'others', however were not collected during the field investigation. It is seen that in Kerala 73 percent of tenant households cultivated 47 percent of the area leased-in on terms other than crop share and cash rent. In Bihar and Orissa 45 and 52 percent of small cultivator households, (lessee) respectively cultivated 28 and 34 percent of leased-in area respectively, on terms which were neither on crop share nor on cash rent basis. In all other major states percentage of this type of small cultivator households were observed to be between 9 and 20 except in Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Uttar Pradesh and Andhra Pradesh where these were 54, 26, 36 and 28 respectively and the percentage of area held were 27, 15, 20 and 29 respectively.

3.21 *State of record of tenancy rights and the nature of disputes*: It is seen from Table (1.6) of Appendix I that of the total number of small cultivator households (lessee) in 31 percent cases the households were ignorant of the record of tenancy rights. In 20 percent cases it was found to be properly recorded. In 22 percent cases the households did not have the occasion to record it. In 23 percent cases although households possessed the land for cultivation purpose it did not have the 'dejure' right as record of tenancy rights did not exist. In 3 percent cases only household could not give a definite answer regarding the record of tenancy rights or the information could not be collected from the sample household. It may be mentioned that while collecting the information on record of tenancy rights if the household had more than one plot of leased-in land and if state of record of tenancy right was different for different plots of land in such cases only one type of state of record of tenancy right was recorded according to the following order of priority viz., 'no provision' as priority 1, 'no' as priority 2, and 'does not know' as priority 3, and 'yes' as priority 4.

3.22 Information was also collected regarding nature of disputes between the tenant household and the owner of the land over the record of tenancy rights. And in such cases where the household had more than one plot of leased-in land and had different nature of disputes for these plots then only one entry was recorded according to the following order of priority viz., 'dispute in court' as priority 1, 'dispute not in court' as priority 2 and 'no dispute' as priority 3. It was seen from Table (1.6) of Appendix I that of the small cultivator tenant households in 74 percent cases there was no dispute with regard to the record of tenancy rights. Out of the remaining cases where disputes regarding record of tenancy rights existed, in 11 percent of them dispute was 'in court', in 6 percent cases it was 'not in court' although dispute existed and in 9 percent cases the household failed to inform regarding this aspect of the leased in land.

3.23 When these households were categorised by the nature of disputes with owner of land and type of records of tenancy rights, it is seen that of the households which had 'no dispute' over the rights of tenancy with the owner only in 23 percent case it was found to be properly recorded and out of the remaining in 34 percent cases it was 'not known' to the household, in 19 percent cases there was 'no provision to record' and in 24 percent cases it was 'not recorded'. Again, among the households which registered their disputes 'in court' only in 21 percent cases the tenancy right was 'recorded' and in the remaining 25 percent had 'no knowledge' of the record, in 30 percent cases there was 'no provision to record' and in 24 percent cases it was 'not recorded'. It is further seen that of the households which had disputes over the record of tenancy rights and had not gone to court for its settlement, only in 14 percent cases tenancy right was found to be recorded and of the rest 86 percent cases it was 'not known' in 23 percent cases, 'not recorded' in almost equal percentage of cases and, 'no provision to record'. Of all these households which had no record of their tenancy rights and specially those which did not record any dispute with the owner are exposed to the risk of being evicted any time and did not have any legal projection of their right of tenancy.

3.24 Among the major states it is seen from Table (3.9) of Appendix 3 that in Jammu & Kashmir 52 percent of tenant households had records of tenancy rights and in Gujarat, Maharashtra, Punjab and Rajasthan this percentage varied between 30 to 40. In Kerala and Gujarat in a little more than 45 and 40 percent of cases respectively tenancy right was not recorded. The other states where this percentage was between 30 and 35 are Punjab, Tamil Nadu and West Bengal and between 20 and 30 are Andhra Pradesh, Assam, Bihar, Madhya Pradesh, Mysore and Rajasthan. In Haryana nearly 48 percent of households having leased in land did not have the knowledge of the record of tenancy rights. In Madhya Pradesh, Orissa, Punjab, Tamil Nadu, Andhra Pradesh, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal this percentage varied between 30 to 40. In some of the states like Assam, Bihar and Mysore nearly 30 to 40 percent of such tenant households did not have the provision to record the right of tenancy.

3.25 Table (3.10) of Appendix 3 shows percentage distribution of small cultivator households having 'leased in' land by nature of dispute over its tenancy right on the 'leased in' plots of land for all states. In most of the major states more than 70 percent of small cultivator tenant households except in Andhra Pradesh (57 percent) Kerala (66 percent), Maharashtra (69 percent), Mysore (59 percent) and Rajasthan (58 percent) did not have any dispute over its tenancy rights. Kerala reported that in 66 percent cases there were 'no dispute' but in 30 percent out of the remaining 34 percent cases disputes were 'in the court'. Gujarat is the only state where there was not a single household having leased-in cultivated land which reported to have any dispute over its tenancy rights. In Rajasthan it is seen that 58 percent of such households reported to have 'no dispute' but in 31 percent of cases existence of disputes was reported out of which 5 percent cases were sub-judice and remaining 26 percent cases were not placed in the court of law. In Bihar, Haryana, Maharashtra, Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal about 10 to 20 percent or a little more of such households did not report anything regarding the dispute of its tenancy rights.

3.26 *Credit need of Small cultivator households*: Information was collected from each sample household of small cultivators regarding the *additional* amount of money they needed for development and improvement of the cultivated land by providing better irrigation and adopting improved agricultural techniques. For this amount the household needed credit. The requirement of a cultivator household was divided into three types of needs viz. (i) long term (ii) medium term and (iii) short term.

3.27 In Table (1.7) of Appendix I it is seen that total credit need of a small cultivator was Rs. 680 in a year on an average in the country. The range of this credit need lay between Rs. 168 in Kerala to Rs. 4894 in Punjab amongst the major states. [Table 3.11, Appendix 3]. It is also seen that out of the total credit requirement Rs. 454 was for long-term planning, Rs. 154 for medium term and Rs. 72 for short term one. On an average a small cultivator needed Rs. 121 for purchase of draught animals. For better cultivation, a small cultivator household estimated his total requirement as about Rs. 481 and on an average a small cultivator household was found to have resource of worth Rs. 27 only. That is, a household's average net requirement for expansion of cultivation would be nearly 18 times the available resources.

3.28 Estimates of total credit needs per small cultivator household are presented in Table (3.11) of Appendix 3 for each of the states. It is seen that small cultivator households of Punjab needed total credit which amounted to nearly Rs. 5000 which was nearly 3 times that of the all India average. Among other states of the Northern India, Jammu & Kashmir and Rajasthan showed a credit need of about Rs. 1900 and Rs. 1500 respectively. In Haryana it was little over Rs. 1000 and in Uttar Pradesh it was seen to be nearly Rs. 500. In Eastern part of the country the credit need was found to be much below the all-India average need of household and varied between to Rs. 276 in West Bengal to Rs. 655 in Assam. In Western Part only households of Maharashtra showed a need of nearly Rs. 1000, whereas other states viz. Gujarat and Madhya Pradesh showed a need of nearly Rs. 189 and Rs. 468 respectively. In South India it is seen that while small cultivator household of Mysore had a credit need of Rs. 1137, it was Rs. 168 in Kerala. Tamil Nadu and Andhra Pradesh reported to have resource requirements amounting to Rs. 707 and Rs. 559 respectively.

3.29 *Distribution of total need by type of need*: On an all-India basis it is seen from Table (3.11) of Appendix 3 that 67 percent of the total need was for long term development purposes viz. for providing better irrigation facilities, adopting improved techniques, and improvement of land etc, 23 percent of the need, termed as medium term credit need, was for purchase of bullocks or other agricultural implements essential for cultivation. Remaining of the total credit need of a small cultivator household was for 'short term' requirements like seeds etc.

3.30 Among the major states, on an average a small cultivator household reported 90 percent, 83 percent, 78 percent and 75 percent of total credit need for 'long term'

planning purposes in the Punjab, Gujarat, Jammu & Kashmir & Madhya Pradesh respectively. In Haryana, Orissa, Rajasthan, Tamil Nadu and Uttar Pradesh long-term need was found to be between 60 and 75 percent on an average for a small cultivator household. In the states of Bihar, Kerala and Maharashtra long term need was more than 50 percent but less than 60 percent of total need. Small cultivator households of Assam and West Bengal, on an average showed this need as below 50 percent of the total need.

3.31 It is further seen that the credit need of small cultivator households in most of the major states for purchase of bullocks or other draught animals and agricultural implements which is termed as medium-term credit was less than or equal to 30 percent of total credit need. In Bihar, Kerala and West Bengal medium-term credit need was 34, 38 and 41 percents of total credit need respectively. Households of Gujarat reported medium term need as 1.80 percent which meant that purchase of draught animal was not economical to them or perhaps these households did not require to purchase draught animal for cultivation.

3.32 Small cultivators of all major states except those of Assam and Maharashtra reported credit need for short-term purposes amounting to less than 15 percent of total credit need. While those of Assam and Maharashtra reported to need about 27 and 18 percent of total credit need respectively for short-term purposes.

### Section 3; Income, expenditure and indebtedness.

3.33 *Distribution of households by annual receipt*: Distributions of small cultivator and wage earner households by annual receipt class are shown in Table (10) below. It is seen that a little less than 50 percent of households had annual income less than Rs. 1000 among small cultivator and wage earner households. About 40 percent of these households had annual income between Rs. 1000 and 2000. And about 11 percent of households amongst small cultivator and wage earner households had an annual income of Rs. 2000 and above.

3.34 The distribution of households by receipt class for each state given in Table (11) showed that in Bihar, Orissa, Madhya Pradesh, Andhra Pradesh and Tamil Nadu more than 50 percent households of both categories belonged to annual income class of less than Rs. 1000. In Uttar Pradesh and Rajasthan more than 50 percent of small cultivator households belonged to income group of less than Rs. 1000 and 45 to 49 percent of wage earner households of these states belonged to same level of income. West Bengal and Assam in the eastern region Gujarat and Maharashtra in Western region and Kerala in the Southern region showed greater concentration of either one or both of the categories of weaker section households viz., small cultivator households and wage earner households, in the income class of Rs. 1000 to Rs. 1999, while Haryana and Punjab showed maximum concentration of small cultivator and wage earner households in the income class of Rs. 2000 and above. In Jammu & Kashmir while small cultivator households had the highest concentration (49 percent), in the middle income group, Rs. 1000—2000 most of the wage earners households (56 percent) belonged to the highest income group, Rs. 2000 and above.

3.35 *Average annual income of small cultivator households* : Average annual income of a small cultivator household was obtained as Rs. 1176 [Table (2.1)] during last one year at the all India level. The income from farm was obtained after deduction of expenditure made on farm during the same reference year from the gross value of crop and livestock product produced during the reference year. And the total income of the household was obtained by aggregating net income from agriculture with that obtained from enterprises other than agriculture; wage employment, hire of draught animals, agricultural implements, carts etc., income from property, transfer receipt and receipts from any non-gainful occupation. On an examination of average income of small cultivator household belonging to different levels of annual income from Table (2.1A) of Appendix 2 it is seen that 49 percent of small cultivator households in rural areas of the country had an annual earning which fell short of the average earning obtained for all such households. And on comparison of average household income of bottom income class with that of highest income class it is seen that average earning of households having annual earning of Rs. 3000 and above was 26 times more than those belonging to the bottom class viz. those with less than Rs. 300.

3.36 *Annual income of wage earner households*: From table (2.2B) of Appendix 2 it is seen that average annual income of a wage earner household was Rs. 1196 during last one year. This income was derived mainly from wage employment. The other sources of income were enterprises other than agriculture, kitchen garden and livestock produce, hire out of animal etc., income from property, transfer receipt and receipts from non-gainful occupations. The distribution pattern of the annual income of the wage earner households was found to be similar to that of the small cultivator households.

3.37 *Statewise estimate of annual income per small cultivator and wage-earner households*: Average annual earning of small cultivator and wage earner households for different states are presented in table (12). It shows that small cultivator and wage earner households of Orissa earned the lowest amount which was a little over Rs. 800. A small cultivator household of Haryana and wage-earner household of Punjab earned more than of Rs. 2500 annually which were the highest average annual incomes of small cultivator and wage-earner households of all states. That is, the earning of the weaker section households of Orissa was found to be almost one-third of that of Haryana and Punjab. When compared to All-India average income of small cultivator and wage earner households, it is seen that average annual income of weaker section households of Orissa is a little more than 60 percent of the all-India average income, while the average income of those households in Haryana and Punjab was found to be 171 and 217 percent of All India average. States other than Orissa, where average income of these households are lying below the all-India average income of both types of weaker section households are Bihar, Madhya Pradesh, Andhra Pradesh, Mysore and Tamil Nadu. In Uttar Pradesh and Rajasthan average annual incomes of small cultivator households only was seen to lag behind that of all-India. The average income of wage earner households of West Bengal was found to be almost equal to the all-India average income of such households.

3.38/ *Income from farm of small cultivator households*: Average net annual income from farm of small cultivator household and its percentage to total annual income are shown in Table (13) for all-India and States. It is seen that a small cultivator household earned Rs. 412 from cultivation during one year, which was 35 percent of the total income of the household. State-wise speaking small cultivator households of Punjab and Haryana earned a little more than Rs. 1800 from farm, which constituted about 76 and 71 percent of their total income respectively as against Rs. 141 i.e. 11 percent of total income, in Kerala. All the States of northern part of the country viz. Rajasthan, Jammu & Kashmir and Uttar Pradesh besides Punjab and Haryana, Assam of the eastern part, Gujarat of the Western part and Mysore of South reported a higher average income from farm than the all India average while for the rest of the major states, average farm income was lower than the same obtained for all small cultivator households of the country.

3.39 *Income from wage employment of wage earner household*: It is seen from the above table that 75 percent of annual income of wage earners household, amounting to Rs. 892 was earned as hired labour in rural India. Among the states wage earner households of Jammu & Kashmir reported to have the highest average earning from wage employment viz. Rs. 1616 which was 74 percent of the total income. And Orissa with an average income of Rs. 605 from wage employment, which was also 74 percent of the total income of a wage earner household of the state, was the lowest. In Kerala the percentage of earning from wage employment to the total income of a wage earner household was highest viz. 85. Other states where this percentage was 80 and above are Bihar, West Bengal, Maharashtra, Mysore and Tamil Nadu and was 75 or more but less than 80 are Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh and Andhra Pradesh. On comparison of the average income from wage employment of wage earner households of all the two major states with that from farm of small cultivator households it was found that in almost all the states the former was not only higher but in some states it was almost 2 to 3 times the latter while in Kerala it was more than 9 times whereas in Haryana and Punjab the situation was just reverse. The average income from wage employment of wage earner households was found to be lower than that of all India average in Bihar, Orissa, Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Andhra Pradesh and Tamil Nadu. In Mysore on an average income from wage employment was same as that of All India average of wage earner households.

3.40 *Number of earners per household*: It is seen from Table (2.3A) of Appendix (2) that on an average there were 1.11 males, 0.59 females and 0.17 child earners per small cultivator household. In other words nearly 111 males, 59 females and 17 children worked for the earning of their respective households per every 100 small cultivator households. When these households are classified by receipt classes it is seen that number of male earners varied between 75 to 98 per 100 such households belonging to different levels of annual receipt less than rupees 1000. The number of male earners was maximum viz. 191 per 100 households with annual receipt of Rs. 3000 and above.

3.41 Again in Table (2.3B) of Appendix (2) the wage earner households were also observed to have a similar pattern with regard to the number of earning members in a household. It has been found that on an average these were 1.02 male, 0.59 female and 0.15 child earner per wage earner household in rural area of the country. In other words at the All India level number of male earners was 102 per 100 households which was less than that of small cultivator households. The number of female earners was same as that of small cultivator households viz. 59 and number of child earners were observed to be a little less than that of small cultivator household viz. 15 per 100 households. It is seen from the table that households with annual receipt less than Rs. 300 had on an average 51 male, 58 female and 6 child earners per 100 households. In households with annual receipts more than Rs. 300 but less than Rs. 600 the numbers were 58 males, 56 females and 6 child earners. And in households with annual receipts more than Rs. 600 the number of male earners varied between 89 to 184, of females earners between 53 to 76 and of child earners between 11 to 32 at different levels of annual household receipt, per 100 households of wage earners.

3.42 *Household Consumption Expenditure per month*: Expenditure incurred for household consumption purpose was found to be Rs. 124 per month (i.e. Rs. 1488 per year) on an average for a small cultivator household in the rural area of the country as shown in Table (14) below, whereas the average consumer expenditure per month of a wage earner household was obtained as Rs. 111 per month, (i.e. Rs. 1332 per year). Thus it is seen that annually a small cultivator household was found to spend on an average Rs. 156 more than a wage earner household on household consumption. On an examination of monthly consumer expenditure of households belonging to small cultivator and wage earner categories by their annual receipt in Table (15), it is seen that monthly consumer expenditure of a small cultivator household for all size classes of annual income were more than those of wage earner households. About 18 percent of small cultivator households

and also about equal percentage of wage earner households with annual income less than Rs. 600 had monthly consumer expenditure of about Rs. 80 and Rs. 55 respectively. Nearly 30 percent of small cultivator and wage earner households with income between Rs. 600 and Rs. 999 had monthly consumer expenditure of Rs. 98 and Rs. 85 respectively. About 40 percent of these households in the annual receipt class between Rs. 1000 and Rs. 1999 had monthly consumer expenditure of Rs. 137 and Rs. 123 respectively. Thus it is seen that about 50 percent of these households spent less than Rs. 100 per month on consumer expenditure, which comes to about Rs. 3 per day.

3.43 *State-wise annual expenditure of small cultivators and wage earner households* : The annual expenditure of households of small cultivator and wage earners by states and all-India is presented as follows in Table (16). It is seen from the table that small cultivator households and wage earner households of Punjab had the highest annual consumer expenditure per household viz. Rs. 3180 and Rs. 2506 respectively, whereas corresponding households in Orissa reported the lowest viz. Rs. 1114 and Rs. 924 respectively. It is also seen that annual consumer expenditure per small cultivator household belonging to the states of Bihar, Orissa, West Bengal, Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Andhra Pradesh, Kerala and Tamil Nadu were below the corresponding all-India average which was Rs. 1485. Wage earner households of these States excluding Kerala also reported average annual expenditure per household as below that of all India.

3.44 *Household asset* : An account of the household physical assets and financial assets was obtained as on date of survey. Physical assets included land, building, tools and implements, machinery, transport equipment, furniture, fittings and fixture, and other fixed assets meant for the use of household enterprise. Financial assets included shares, bonds etc. Durable goods exclusively meant for domestic use was not taken into account for this purpose.

3.45 Small cultivator households and wage earner households were classified by total value of assets of the household and percentage distribution of these households by value of asset is presented in Table (17). It is seen from this table that nearly 32 percent of small cultivator households had assets of worth less than Rs. 1000 and 41 percent had worth Rs. 1000 and more but of worth less than Rs. 3000 and rest of the households had assets of value Rs. 3000 and more. It is also seen that only about 4 percent of small cultivator household reported possession of assets worth Rs. 10,000 and more. On the contrary nearly 46 percent of the wage earner households reported possession of assets of value less than Rs. 500 and 71 percent had assets worth less than Rs. 1000. Nearly 6 percent of households possessed assets worth Rs. 3000 and more and only 0.7 percent of these households reported to have asset of worth Rs. 10,000 and more. Nearly 2 percent of wage earner households did not report for the value of household assets as against 0.1 percent in small cultivator households.

3.46 *Value of assets per household by States*: On an average a small cultivator household and a wage earner household was found to possess asset of worth Rs. 2753 [Table (18)]. The asset was evaluated at current price for ascertaining its value. State-wise estimates of value of physical and financial assets per household of small cultivator and of wage earners respectively are also presented in Table (18). It is seen from this Table that small cultivator households of Gujarat, Haryana, Jammu & Kashmir, Maharashtra, Punjab, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh, reported assets on an average of worth greater than that of all small cultivator households in the rural area of the country. Small cultivator households of Punjab and Haryana were found to possess on an average assets worth about Rs. 15,000 and Rs. 11,000 respectively, which were more than 5 times and nearly 4 times that of all such households in the rural area of the country. Values of assets per small cultivator households of Bihar, Orissa and West Bengal of Eastern India, Andhra Pradesh, Kerala and Tamil Nadu of Southern India were found to be less than Rs. 2000. Assam and Mysore reported that in these states per household value of assets of small cultivator households were a little less than that obtained for all such households in the rural area of the country. Small cultivator households of Orissa were founded to possess assets having the lowest value viz. Rs. 1150 compared to average value of all the major states shown in Table (18).

3.47 It is further seen that the estimates of value of assets per wage earner household of different states were found to have almost a similar pattern as that of the small cultivator households. While this value was found to be highest of all of the major states in Rajasthan, (Rs. 3728) it was least (Rs. 429) in Kerala. Thus, it is seen that for the States of Gujarat, Haryana, Jammu & Kashmir, Mysore, Punjab, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh the per household value of assets exceeded the average value of assets of all such households in the rural area of the country. It is interesting to note that average value of assets of small cultivator households in most of the major states was found to be 2 to 3 times that of wage-earner households. In Haryana, Maharashtra and Punjab the proportions were even higher. But in Rajasthan the value of assets of a wage earner household was a little more than that of small cultivator household.

3.48 *Household indebtedness*: Information on loan outstanding on the date of survey was collected for small cultivator and wage earner households. In Table (19) estimates of loan outstanding on the date of survey for the two categories of households are presented by value of household asset. Estimates thrown up show that on the date of survey a small cultivator household on an average reported to have higher liabilities than the wage-earner household. On the date of survey the former category of households gave on account of Rs. 335 as outstanding loan as against Rs. 210 for the other. These households when grouped by value of household assets it is seen that outstanding loan increased with increase in household asset in general and this was true for both small cultivator as well as wage earner households. This was obviously so because capacity to borrow was greater for households with higher assets.

3.49 It is seen from the following Table (20) which shows statewise estimates of loan outstanding on date of survey per small cultivator and per wage earner households, that outstanding loan was greater for those states which had reported higher average annual income. Thus, per household outstanding loans in Haryana were Rs. 2357 and Rs. 729 and in Punjab were Rs. 868 and Rs. 567 per small cultivator household and per wage earner household respectively, whereas small cultivator households of Kerala and wage earners households of West Bengal reported average loan outstanding as Rs. 91 and Rs. 46 respectively which were the lowest of all states for the respective categories of households. In general, the average amount of loan outstanding on date of survey of small cultivator household of all the major states was greater than that of wage earner households. The reason probably is that the small cultivator household had to take loan for farming, which was not necessary in the case of wage earner households. Moreover, land being an asset cultivator households were in a better position to borrow against their land than their counterpart could,

3.50 *Percentage of indebted households*: All-India percentage of the two categories of households which had loans outstanding on the date of survey are presented in Table (2.8a) and Table (2.8b) of Appendix (2). It has been observed that 63 percent of total number of small cultivator households and 60 percent of wage earner households of the rural area of the country had reported loan outstanding on the date of survey. For both the types of households this percentage had a rising trend with the increase in the value of household assets.

## APPENDIX IV

### Sampling Design and Estimation Procedure

1. *Sample Design*: The sample design of the rural survey of the NSS twentyfifth round was a stratified one with two-stage selection within each stratum. The first stage units were villages and the second stage units were households for the socio-economic enquiries. The sample design had been made *self-weighting* for each schedule of enquiry at the state level. The sample villages were usually selected in the form of two independent and interpenetrating sub-samples. Sub-sample 1 was surveyed by one party of investigators and sub-sample 2 by another party.

2. *Sample size (Central sample)*: The total sample size for household enquiries in the rural areas was 8400 sample villages and the average sample size was expected to be 2 households in a village for each of the schedules 16.1 and 16.2<sup>1</sup>.

3. *Work Programme*: The survey period (one year) of this round had been divided into four sub-rounds of three months duration each. In each sub-sample of a rural stratum there were 12 sample villages. These 12 villages were sub-divided into four sets of three villages each in a specified manner. For one sub-round out of these 12 villages, only three villages were selected and were surveyed in the sub-round. Thus on the whole, all the 12 villages were covered once during the full survey period.

4. *Sampling frame*: The frame was the list of villages as per the 1961 population census.

5. *Stratification*: The country had been divided into 65 agricultural regions by grouping within each state or union territory, districts having similar population density and crop pattern, Strata are formed within each region, by grouping tehsils (i) which are contiguous, (ii) having similar crop pattern and population density and (iii) having good transport facilities amongst them. The number of persons engaged in agricultural occupation is more or less the same for each stratum within a region.

6. *Allocation*: The all-India sample size had been allocated to the states on a joint consideration of their rural population, area under cereal crops and available investigator strength. This was modified to (i) ensure a multiple of 360 villages in each state (excepting Haryana and Punjab), (ii) take account of state-wise variation in workload and (iii) make the sample size a multiple of 24 in order to facilitate an allocation of 24 villages in each rural stratum.

7. *Selection of villages*: For the central sample, in each stratum, two independent sub-samples of 12 villages each had been selected circular systematically with equal probability.

8. *Selection of households*: All the households in the sample village were divided into the following three sub-strata: (1) households having no cultivated land, (2) the lowest ten percent of households having cultivated land and (3) remaining households. Households deriving more or less regular and major income in the last year from self-employment in training establishment, manufacture, construction, mechanised transport,

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<sup>1</sup>The actual number of households selected for survey was for below this expected level in the first two sub-round. As the design was self-weighting, the intervals for household selection were subsequently reduced to realise a larger sample in the last two sub-rounds.

professions or salaried employment or rent were excluded from both sub-strata 1 and 2 and were included in sub-stratum 3. Samples for schedules 16.1, 16.(2) & 16(R) were selected from sub-stratum 2, 1 & 3 respectively. Sample households were selected linear systematically using intervals and random start specified for this purpose so as to get about 2 sample households on an average from each sub-stratum.
